May Build.—Wm. Hole is said to be figuring on the erection of a building at the southwest corner of Third and Central avenue for a large local retail firm.

Hurt in Mill.—J. A. Goodwill, a well-known Coos Bay man, was quite severely bruised and crushed yesterday while working in the old Bay City mill, a timber falling on him. No bones were broken. He was taken to Mercy hospital where he is getting along nicely.

Jail Full.—Acting Marshal R. C. Cordes last evening had the Marshfield city jail filled to the limit. "Klondyke" Elliott of Bastendorf's beach, was one of his boarders and several of the others were fishermen from the Siuslaw, who started to make things too lively here.

Takes Salmon Eggs.—Superintendent Frank Smith of the Coos River hatchery, and his men will today begin taking salmon eggs for the season's hatch. He expects to secure about six million. The salmon are killed and stripped of their eggs, each fish furnishing about 25,000 eggs.

May Move Here.—Mr. Perry, who has been conducting a Veneer factory at Bandon, is on the Bay looking for a site for his business here. He has decided to move from Bandon, the city council refusing to open up a street to the best site obtainable. Then he thinks he will have better shipping facilities here.

Large Funeral.—The funeral of Ernest Cutlip, Sunday, was largely attended, the Marshfield Aerle of Eagles turning out well for it. The funeral services were conducted in the South Coos River chapel by the Rev. R. G. Summerlin of North Bend, many going from Marshfield and North Bend.

Had Basket Social.—The Swedish Linnea Society held a most successful basket social and entertainment at the Finnish hall Saturday evening. There was a good attendance and the baskets brought as high as \$7.50 each and averaged about \$5.00. There was a program and general entertainment, making the evening a most delightful one.

Local Men Play.—At Corvallis Saturday, Oregon Agricultural college was defeated by the University of Washington by a score of 18 to 0. Considerable interest was felt in the game here owing to Gordon Rasmussen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nels Rasmussen and a former Marsh-

field high school star, playing right half for O. A. C. while Floyd Huntley, a brother of Harry Huntley of North Bend, played left and on the same time. Washington was much heavier than the Oregon team.

Mail Service.—Nothing has developed in the Coos Bay mail service question since yesterday. Senator Chamberlain has wired that the post-office department can't pay special rates for carrying mails on the train so the only way to get Sunday service appears to be a star route, bids for which have been advertised for.

Busy at Florence.—The Florence West in its last issue announces that good progress is being towards the improvements of that harbor. It states that Morris Brothers of Portland, have approved of the \$100,000 bond issue and will furnish the money as soon as the bonds are engraved and signed. Notices for bids for the construction of the wharf and jetty are now being published, and it is hoped to get the work under way about February 1. Engineer Carroll of the United States Engineering Office, is now on the ground to survey the port but has been delayed by the rough weather.

More Candidates.—W. O. W. will take in another class of candidates tomorrow evening. The local camp of the Woodmen of the World are taking in classes of candidates at every meeting. BIG ISSUE OF NEW PENNIES

Public Has All of the 28,328,000 Coined By the Mint.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 15. — The 17,227,350 bits of coin executed at the mints of the United States during October were valued at \$2,062,640 according to the monthly coinage statement issued by the treasury. In addition there were 126,000 silver peso pieces coined for the Philippine government.

Two hundred sixty-five thousand three hundred and fifty pieces of the United States coinage, valued at \$1,793,500 were in gold, both eagles and half eagles. Half dollars and quarter dollars made an aggregate of 248,000 pieces of silver, valued at \$102,000. There were 16,714,000 of the new Lincoln pennies issued.

All of the original "V. D. B." Lincoln pennies which aroused such wide interest because of the prominence of Designer Brenner's initials on them and the subsequent change of dies to make the initials less conspicuous, have passed into the public hands. There were 28,328,000 of them issued and not a cent of that famous issue is left.

Of the 4,000,000,000 gallons of wine manufactured in the civilized world every year, about 40,000,000 are made in the United States.
