Dies In Coquille.—Lewis Holm, who last week was brought to the county hospital in a very serious condition, passed away Sunday. The

deceased was a native of Finland, and has a sister, Mrs. Sund of Marshfield, and a brother at Santa Rosa, California.—Coquille Herald.
