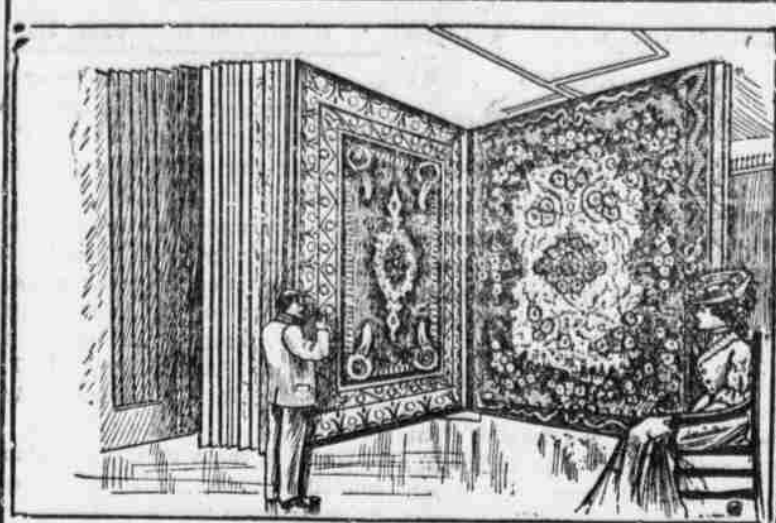

NEWS FROM ALL OVER COOS COUNTY**GOES FAR UP STREAM.**

South Fork of Coquille Open to Navigation Far Up.

The Coquille Herald says: "Capt. Moomaw has been at the wheel of the steamer Echo on the Coquille-Myrtle Point run for a day or so the last of the week. While he was in charge of the Echo, Capt. Panter took the Myrtle and made a trip up the South Fork, going as far as the Capt. Harris ford, which we understand, is the farthest a steamer has ever been up that branch of the Coquille. It is the intention of Messrs. Panter and Kime to make several runs up that stream as well as up the North Fork, from this sections large quantities of produce will be brought out, which will prove a good thing for farmers of the upper river."

RAISES BIG CARROTS.

Four Produced in Coquille Valley Weigh About 30 Pounds.

Geo. S. Davis was down from his ranch Monday and left with us four stock carrots that he raised this year, the aggregate weight of which was about thirty pounds. The largest of the four weighed eight and one-quarter pounds. These are a fine dairy cow feed and produce largely to the acre and should be grown extensively by dairymen.—Coquille Herald.
