Postpone Ball.—The Marshfield fire department has decided to hold their annual ball February 22 instead of Christmas eve as has been the custom for some time.

Dance Wednesday.—The Millicoma Club will give a dance Wednesday evening. The Elks are planning to give a dance, but probably will not arrange for it for a week or two.

Get Many Ducks.—Duck hunters around the Bay fared pretty well yesterday. Seven members of the Glasgow Gun Club bagged forty. Frank Denning got eight and others did almost as well.

Finally, one day, he returned after an absence of several hours, carrying the cat, which had died. No one interfered with him and he took the cat out under a big tree near the ranch house and buried her.

Kills Bird Hawk.—Mrs. E. S. Bargelt Saturday demonstrated her prowess as a hunter by killing a bird hawk with a rifle after the bird had killed one of her songsters.
