ASSEMBLIES AND ASSEMBLIES.

THE COOS BAY TIMES is a republican newspaper and recognizes that there are progressive principles of republicanism. It believes in these progressive principles and that is why it does not desire to turn its back on the direct primary law.

In discussing the assembly plan, the Salem Journal says in reference to these progressive principles:

For instance, tariff revision and postal savings banks are not to be obtained by standing for the party "as she was."

Cannibals and Aldrichism are not all there is of the republican party, and so in Oregon a man may still be a republican for progress.

The editor of this paper can see how an assembly of representative republicans might be held and help harmonize the party in Oregon.

That kind of an assembly to hear good republican speeches, and write a good republican platform, could "do the party some good."

The party managers could go a step further and endorse the progressive laws enacted by the people in their sovereign capacity.

They could recommend strict obedience to the laws and that all candidates submit their aspirations under the direct primary law.

Such an assembly which is not prohibited by law would help to wipe out all dissensions in the party and pave the way to victory.

It is a fundamental principle of republicanism to recognize the expressed will of majorities and even of legally constituted pluralities.

Would the assembly advocates condemn the expressed will of the people of Oregon upon any matter that had been fairly submitted to them?

Mr. Hugh Hume of the Portland Spectator thinks the opposition to

the assembly plan of nominating candidates for office comes from those who want dissensions in the republican party.

It is a waste of time to discuss the question with those wise political managers at Portland who have determined to hold an assembly and place a republican ticket of their own in the field.

They openly condemn the workings of the direct primary law and openly declare there must be a better system, and they have adopted the assembly plan as that better plan.

The assembly of republicans will not be so cowardly as to refuse to make a platform, and will, of course, condemn the direct primary and other reforms enacted by the people of Oregon.

How that will unite the republican party is hard to see, and yet these assembly advocates coolly declare the whole purpose of the assembly is to restore harmony in the republican party which enacted the direct primary law after endorsing it in its platforms.

The people are warned—keep control of the nomination power and the full control of the avenues to political power. If they surrender them to the bosses and the old machine politicians at this time they will never recover their control of their own affairs. Having learned to nominate and elect our United States senators by the direct vote of the people, they have still to learn how to curb the rapacity of a self-perpetrating machine in the legislature that is extending its functions and literally eating up the taxpayers.

The people have concentrated all their energies on destroying the purchase and sale plan of electing senators by the legislature and must now turn their attention to breaking the strangle-hold of graft in the legislature.

Direct primary laws have been enacted in many states and direct nomination and election of senators has been adopted by some of the great eastern states, and by all the states around Oregon, and Washington and Idaho have not only direct primary nominations but allow all voters a second choice on candidates for important places. Why should the people of Oregon be deprived of their simple right to a direct vote as to who shall be their public servants merely to please the selfish political bosses who have not the general interest at heart as the basis of their political activity?

Again let all citizens be warned to not ally themselves with the movement to call political assemblies to take away from the people their supreme control over public affairs, and a system of government that establishes responsibility to the electorate instead of the political boss and the worn-out machine. This is the squarest issue ever brought before the people of Oregon and it has been raised by the representatives of the selfish interests that seek special privileges that they are not willing to accord to others in the realm of government.
