and an unknown Italian, who is said
to have been left aboard the Argo.
These former two were lost when
the Garibaldi lifesaving boat swamp-
ed Friday afternoon while attempt-
ing a rescue when the Argo first
stranded on the south spit of Tillamook
bay. Henry Wickman, a mem-
ber of the Garibaldi lifesaving crew,
lost his life Friday afternoon when
the lifesavers attempted the rescue
which resulted in the swamping of
the lifeboat.

Had Close Call.

"It is presumed that Captain Snyder
and the men in the small life-
boat were blown and drifted in a
northerly direction all during the
night, finally by the sheerest good
luck, being driven toward the light-
ship. Had they passed a mile to
either side in all probability they
would never have been able to make
their way to it, so strong were the
seas running. Had they drifted out
to sea their chances of living many
hours longer were small indeed, for
the weather became worse after day-
light. Thus it would seem they were
driven by winds and waves to the
one point along the coast where
succor lay. Yet once alongside the
lightship the task of getting onto it
without having their frail craft dash-
ed to pieces against its sides must
have been a precarious one.

During the afternoon, sea going
men of this port gave the men up
as irretrievably lost, as the gale dur-
ing the day and early morning hours
raged with an intensity that would
not permit any small boat to survive
long."

Stories of Heroism.

"Heroism of a rare type cheated
death many times in the rescue of
victims from the steamer Argo. High
praise is given First Mate Johnson
of the Argo, whose cool-headedness
brought the first boat of wreck vic-
tims to safety. L. A. Holdredge of
Portland, saw his wife go down be-
neath the waves Friday afternoon
when the Garibaldi life-saving boat
swamped. He witnessed the super-
human efforts of the lifesaving crew
to save her.

"W. King of Tillamook cannot
soon forget the life saver's rescue of
his wife after the mountainous waves
had washed her overboard from the
boat. And E. L. Hunter, while al-
most prostrated because of the loss
of his 13-year-old daughter, ex-
presses undying gratitude to W. R.
Dean in rescuing his other child, 7
year old, from the fate that befell
her sister.

"With a broken arm, sustained
when the life saving boat swamped
in the terrific waves, Captain Farley
of the life saving crew, stayed with
his crew Friday afternoon, and it
was largely due to his efforts that
the rescue work was so successful."
