PROTECT THE MINERS.

IT IS EARNESTLY hoped that the appalling coal mine disaster at Cherry, Ill., may arouse congress and state legislators to a keener realization of their duty of throwing greater safeguards around that large and industrious body of American citizens who mine the country's coal and metals.

Official statistics sent out a few days ago from Washington disclosing the relatively high death rate in the coal mines of this country as compared to those of Europe are a reproach to our law makers. The death rate in the coal mines of the United States is 49 in the thousand. The European death rate is 15 in the thousand, notwithstanding that authorities tell us that the natural conditions of coal mining are much less dangerous in the United States than in Europe.

Even if we throw around our miners every safeguard that science and forethought can provide there will occur, at best, an occasional shocking disaster with all the attendant distress and pitiful scenes that wring the heart when many wives are made widows and many children left fatherless.

NOTICE OF ANNUAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION OF THE CITY OF MARSHFIELD.

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 7th day of December, 1909, there will be held at the City Hall of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, a regular general election, for the purpose of electing a Mayor to serve for the term of two years; for the purpose of electing two members of the Common Council to serve for the term of three years each; for the purpose of electing one member of the Common Council to serve for the term of one year; for the purpose of electing a Recorder for the term of one year; and for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters for their approval or rejection "An Act to amend the Charter of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, so the Council of Marshfield shall have power to grant franchises for street and other railway purposes without petition of the owners of property abutting upon the streets occupied thereby; but, subject to the right of the Council to refer the ordinances, granting such franchise, to a vote of the people of Marshfield, Oregon, before they become operative, and to the right of the people to demand the 'referendum' thereon as provided by law; and, providing that such ordinances shall not become operative until Thirty Days after final passage," and for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said city for their approval or rejection "An Ordinance granting to J. M. Blake, his heirs and assigns, the right to build, maintain and operate a railway system upon Front Street North, Front Street South, Broadway North, Broadway South, and Kruse Avenue East in Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, to be operated by electricity or other mechanical power except steam, for the purpose of carrying passengers, express, baggage, mail and freight, and requiring grantees to handle, haul and switch cars or trains of cars of railroads over his tracks at such uniform and regular rates and under reasonable regulations to be fixed by said City of Marshfield."

The said election will be held between the hours of Nine o'clock A.M. and Six o'clock P.M.

That J. R. Lightner, John Bear, and A. G. Aiken have been heretofore by the Common Council of said City appointed as Judges of said election, and F. M. Friedberg, C. A. Pennock and Roy Lawhorn as Clerks of said election. JOHN W. BUTLER, Recorder of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon.
