KEEPING HISTORY STRAIGHT.

Editor Times:
If you will permit someone else besides the Administration Club and the candidates, a word or two, I would like to give a few facts about the present campaign and to correct some misrepresentations that have been made by the Administration Club.

Take for instance their attack on City Recorder Butler, showing one of the greatest backward somersaults of the campaign. A few days ago, they were endorsing and praising him as an excellent official and man, evidently hoping to gain votes from the big following that his able performance of his duties have won. When they found that they could not cajole him into supporting their program, they are now trying to force him.

In Saturday's Times, a couple of items fully substantiated Mr. Butler's course and proved the misrepresentation of him by the Administration Club. Judge Hall, who the older residents will remember, was city treasurer for years told how Experts Lockhart and Poyntz found that the city's debt two years ago was over \$24,000. Now the Administration Club is claiming that it was \$24,000 when Mayor Straw took office. Those who remember "The Campaigner" of two years ago, will remember that they were then claiming the city debt was \$24,000 at that time. This was after two years of Straw's business administration, the details of which are set forth in the Squires' report. Another place in Saturday's Times, showed that City Recorder Butler and Treasurer Williams had certified to the buyers of the city bonds, another monument to Mr. Straw's administration, that the present city debt is over \$60,000 instead of the \$51,000 the Administration Club now claims. It seems to me that the city officials wouldn't certify to a debt of \$60,000 if it is only \$51,000. Also this shows that the city's debt when Mayor Straw first assumed office four years ago must have been not more than \$15,000 or the city would have been more than \$24,000 in the hole after he had served two years.

I attended Saturday night's rally and was not surprised that a Mr. Selby who has scarcely gained residence on the Bay, was chosen to present a statement to controvert the facts presented by C. A. Johnson and Mr. Butler. If you were there, you probably noticed that Mr. Selby stated before alighting the figures that he wasn't sure they were accurate, but he would give them as they were told to him. Why didn't Judge Upton, an old resident and former city official who should be in a position to know the figures were accurate, present them? Was it because they were personally unwilling to vouch for the figures because they were misleading? Mr. Selby counted in \$3,600 as paid for the street roller as making part of the city's debt while we, who were here and familiar with the street roller deal, know it was purchased on the partial payment plan and isn't paid for yet.

I did not mean to write quite so much when I started but I merely wanted to cite a few things concerning the most flagrant errors so I trust you will permit this space in the columns of The Times.
