Get Turbine Pump.—The Coos Bay Water Company received on the steamer Bandon a turbine pump which will be installed near the Gas and Electric Company's plan at Porter for the purpose of pumping water up to the new water tower which is to be installed in North Bend to furnish water for the higher portions of that city. The tank has been completed and will be installed as soon as the weather will permit.

HEAVY SCHOOL TAX.

Bandon Levies 20 Mills For That
Purpose.

The Bandon Recorder says: "The
legal voters of School District No. 64
met in the auditorium of the new
school building Saturday afternoon
and voted a special tax of seventeen
mills, for the purpose of carrying on
the schools for the current year and
to help liquidate the floating debt
caused by the extra expense of the
new school building.

"Those present at the meeting vot-
ed unanimously for the tax, thus show-
ing the spirit that exists in the minds
of the voters in regard to conducting
and maintaining the schools. An-
other three mill tax to be assessed
by the school board will also be
available, which in all will be a
twenty mill tax for school pur-
poses."

DRAWBRIDGE TO BE RUSHED

County Court Asks Bids For
South Slough Structure—
Front Street Road.

L. J. Simpson returned today from
Coquille, where he had been in con-
ference with the Coos county com-
missioners relative to completing the
waterfront road between North Bend
and Marshfield and also in regard to
the construction of the drawbridge
across South Slough.

Preliminary preparations for the
South Slough drawbridge were com-
pleted. The commissioners decided
to advertise for bids for the construc-
tion of the bridge the bids to be
opened at the January session. The
contract will call for the completion
of the bridge so that it will be open
for traffic by June 1, 1910. The
bridge will cost about \$10,000.

In regard to the Front street road,
there was little to be done as the
commissioners have not received the
necessary order from the Oregon
Supreme Court that will permit them
to go ahead. The Menasha Wooden-
ware Company appealed from the
original award of damages, lost in
the circuit court and then appealed to
the supreme court. While they per-
mitted the latter appeal to go by de-
fault, the county commissioners feel
that they cannot be ahead and pay
the damages and have the elevated
roadway completed until the supreme
court so declares. An effort is now
being made to get this order and as
soon as it arrives, the project will be
rushed.

Mr. Simpson says that just as soon
as North Bend is assured that the
county will finish the intermediate
link in the waterfront road, the city
will finish its end of the road.

The local automobile club and
everybody generally is anxious to see
the road opened up as it will be
greatly beneficial to both cities.
