

LARGE NUMBER OF CASES TO BE TRIED IN CIRCUIT COURT

Actions Slated For Hearing at Term Opening Next Monday—Judge Coke to Have Another Judge Come Here Soon.

Judge John S. Coke will convene the regular December term of circuit court at Coquille next Monday. There is a heavy docket for the term. On Friday, Judge Coke will convene the adjourned term on Friday to hear motions, etc., and on Saturday will announce the calendar for the ensuing week.

Owing to the cases of R. A. Graham vs the Southern Pacific, the Spreckels Brothers and others being ready for trial and that through his connection with the company prior to assuming his position on the bench, Judge Coke does not want to hear the case, he endeavored to have Judge Harris of Eugene, Judge Hamilton of Roseburg, or Judge Moore of Portland, to come in and preside this term. They were unable to come, partly because of the rush of business in their own courts and also to the fact that the winter trip in here is so difficult. In consequence, the Graham cases will have to go over. However, unless Gov. Benson names a judge to come in here to hear the Graham cases and any other cases that Judge Coke feels, he is disqualified from hearing, he will ask the Chief Justice of the Oregon Supreme Court to send a judge here to hold an extra term this winter or to hold the next regular term of court in this district.
