**Will Give Dance.**—The Terpsichorean Club, has issued invitations for a dance to be given in the Odd Fellows hall this evening.

**Can't sell Ducks.**—Game Warden Cal Wright announces that the law prohibits the sale of ducks after December 15. The open season does not close for sometime, hunters being merely prohibited from selling the birds.

**Attorneys to Coquille.**—A majority of the Marshfield attorneys went to Coquille today to attend the opening session of the December term of circuit court by Judge Coke. The jurors will not assemble until Monday, today and tomorrow being devoted to motions, etc.

**Is Better.**—Dr. Wm. Horsfall, who has been on crutches for a few days was able to dispense with them. While getting off a hand car at Sumner, he slipped and fell in the darkness, badly bruising his leg. At the time, he paid little attention to it, but it grew considerably worse.

**Found Guilty.**—Justice Pennock yesterday afternoon found John Gilardi guilty of assaulting his wife at her home on Danie's Creek while he was endeavoring to secure their children. A number of witnesses was examined. A fine of \$20 was imposed but Mr. Gilardi says he will appeal.

**Train Derailed.**—The pilot engine going out with the bridge crew this morning was derailed near Beaver Hill Junction and tied up traffic for about two hours. In consequence of the delay, the passenger train was a couple of hours late returning. Yesterday's and today's mail was brought in.

**Accident At Mill.**—The cross-head of one of the engines at the C. A. Smith mill blew out this forenoon and caused the mill to shut down for a while. The operations will be resumed tomorrow with the other engine. A short time ago, the second

engine met with a similar accident. Aside from the cost of the break itself and the delay, no damage resulted.

**Carter to Portland.**—Marshal J. W. Carter left on the stage this morning for Portland where he was summoned as a witness in the Avery counterfeiting case which developed here last July. Avery is in Portland, having furnished \$1,500 bonds for his appearance in federal court December 13. R. C. Cordes is acting marshal during the absence of Mr. Carter.

**Hearing Set.**—H. C. Wells of the Java Coffee House, has furnished bonds for his appearance before Justice Pennock, December 22, to answer the charge of shooting ducks out of a boat on South Slough. Other alleged game law violators may be arraigned at the same time as Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Litjeqvist will come over then to clean up the slate.

**McDonald Writes.**—John Snyder of South Broadway, last night received a letter from Harry McDonald, the brakeman on the local railway and a former boarder at the Snyder hotel, who mysteriously disappeared a few weeks ago. McDonald said that he had to leave rather hastily to get away from troubles of his own. He requested Mr. Snyder to store his belongings until he can come for them later. He is at a logging camp near Bandon.
