All of the candidates for governor, including Dr. Withycombe and Prof. J. H. Ackerman, have endorsed the Assembly or convention plan of nomination, and Judge Dimick now stands as the only candidate who is in favor of the strict observance of the direct primary law in opposition to the Assembly or Convention.

Mr. Dimick, recently, in a public speech, gave his reasons for opposing the Assembly plan as follows:

"Under the Convention system candidates who are generally nominated for state and county offices are but little acquainted with the voters, and the voters know nothing of their qualifications, while under the primary nomination law a candidate is compelled to publicly define his politics and go out among the legal voters and become acquainted with them, so that they may see the man and judge for themselves as to his qualifications.

"Prior to the adoption of the primary nomination law, the Republican party was engulfed in factional strife in every part of the state, and in nearly every county political factions controlled party nominations and in fact made political machines of the courts, and ruled nearly every official elected to a political office, and by reason of that conduct the legal voters of the state became convinced that the welfare of their state demanded some reform along those lines, so that men nominated and elected to office would be obligations to the legal voters, rather than the political faction who were instrumental in securing their nomination for them

A PROCLAMATION.

KNOW ALL MEN That, Whereas, on the 7th day of December, 1909, there was submitted to the legal or rejection at the regular general election held in said City on said date, a proposed Amendment to the Charter of the City of Marshfield, which said Amendment was proposed by the initiative petition of J. M. Blake and entitled

"An Act to amend the Charter of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, so the Council of Marshfield shall have power to grant franchises for street and other railway purposes without petition of the owners of property abutting upon the streets occupied thereby; but, subject to the right of the Council to refer the Ordinances granting such franchises to a vote of the people of Marshfield, Oregon, before they become operative and to the right of the people to demand the "Referendum" thereon as provided by law; and, providing that such ordinances shall not become operative until Thirty Days after final passage," and

WHEREAS at said election, 443 votes were cast for said measure, and 148 votes were east against said

WHEREAS the said measure was approved by a majority of those voting thereon;

THEREFORE, I. E. E. Straw, Mayor of the City of Marshfield, by virtue of the power vested in me by law, do hereby declare and proclaim said measure to be in full force and effect as an Amendment to the City this proclamation, and

WHEREAS, at the said election aforesaid, there was submitted to the legal voters of the City of Marshfield, State of Oregon, for their approval or rejection an ordinance proposed by the initiative petition of J. M. Blake and entitled

"An Ordinance granting to J. M. Blake, his heirs and assigns, the right to build, maintain and operate a railway system upon Front Street North, Front Street South, Broadway North, Broadway South, and Kruse Avenue East in Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, to be operated by electricity or other mechanical power except steam, for the purpose of carrying passengers, express, baggage, mail and freight, and requiring grantee to handle, haul and switch cars or trains of cars of railroads over his tracks at such uniform and regular rates and under reasonable regulations to be fixed by said City of Marshfield," and

WHEREAS, at said election aforesaid, 468 votes were cast in favor of said measure and 125 votes were cast against said measure, and

WHEREAS, the said measure was approved by a majority of those voting thereon:

NOW, THEREFORE, I. E. E. I Straw, Mayor of the City of Marshfield, Oregon, do declare and proclaim the said measure to be in full force and effect as an Ordinance of the City of Marshfield, Oregon, from C and after the date of this proclama-
