MADE MONEY BUT LOST IT

PUGILISTS HAVE WON GREAT WEALTH, BUT HAVE GONE THE PACE AND FAILED TO RETAIN ANY OF THE WEALTH.

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 13.—Through the long list of famous fighters but few names stand out as men who have been provident and saved their money while the harvest was rich. The average fighter lives in his glory, is a so-called good fellow, and blows his coin as fast as he makes it. John L. Sullivan was considered at one time the greatest pugilist spendthrift in the world, but it's a fact that he never made the money the present-day fighters are coining. The largest amount Sullivan ever received for one battle was \$16,000, which he got for defeating Jack Kilrain. Of this sum \$14,000 was handed over by John to a burlesque queen for safekeeping, but she ran away with the dough, and Sullivan has never seen her since. Today Sullivan has more money than at any time when he was the ring champion. He has something like \$100,000 in cold cash where nobody can reach it, and he hasn't had a drink in four long years. It is true that Sullivan has been a great spendthrift, but it is also a fact that he never had the amount of money that the public

generally believed. He probably made a half million dollars out of pugilism and the stage before he began to save.

Bob Fitzsimmons' Money.

The first big money Bob Fitzsimmons won in the ring was in the fight with Jack Dempsey in 1891. He received a paltry thousand, which was the loser's end. After that they didn't do a thing to Robert. He was as green as grass, and soon paid \$11,000 for a house in Frisco worth about \$6,000. Fitz deeded the property to his first wife, who later divorced him and married Martin Julian, while Bob married Julian's sister, Rose. After bearing three children by Fitzsimmons, Rose died about four years ago at Bath Beach. Rose, like Bob's first wife, had all his money and property in her own name, and when she died left everything to her young children. Fitz, therefore, was high and dry again, and had to resume fighting and acting to make a living. Fitz has no money to speak of nowadays, and has got to keep hustling to make ends meet. It wasn't rum or gambling that broke Ruby Robert. It was too much matrimony.

Died in Poverty.

What a mint of money poor little George Dixon made during his long and brilliant career. Yet he died in poverty. Dixon was a great spendthrift and loved to open wine by the case after winning a fight. He won \$22,000 when he defeated Jack Skelly at New Orleans in 1892. Dixon must have fought more than a hundred battles, which netted him more than \$200,000, while he earned probably \$100,000 more in the theatrical business, as he was the star of a burlesque show which toured the United States for many years. It was pitiful to see the little feather weight champion wandering up and down the streets with no home, his clothing shabby. That was a year or so before he was picked up unconscious in the gutter and taken to a hospital, where he died a pauper.

Another Pugilist's Fate.

Peter Jackson was another great pugilist who loved the grape juice. He made money fast when he first came to this country from Australia, defeating such men as George Godfrey, Joe McAuliffe, Patsy Cardiff, Jack Fallon and others. Then he went to England and cleaned up another big bank roll by knocking out Jim Smith and Paddy Slavin.

Jackson was very popular in Great Britain and it was there that he acquired the wine habit. For several years he lived in London at a high rate of speed, and gradually lost his wonderful health and strength. When he returned to Australia, Joe Goddard easily bested him in eight rounds, though it was called a draw. Shortly after that mill, Peter came back to America and fought Jim Corbett a 61-round draw. Then he went on the road under the management of Parson Davies and appeared in "Uncle Tom's Cabin" with considerable success.

Jackson blew his coin as fast as he made it and finally, when he was a physical and financial wreck, he was knocked out in three rounds by Jeffries in 1898. That ended Peter Jackson's ring career and a year later he died without a penny. He had earned probably 1/4 million dollars with his fists, but never thought of saving it.

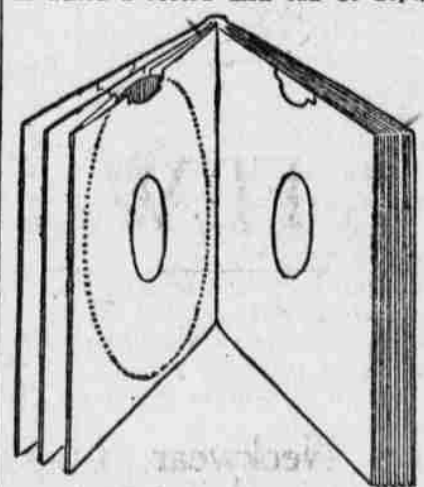

There are lots of brothers who own phonographs who will be happy Christmas morning if they find that some member of the family has made them a holder for phonograph disks. This album is made slightly larger than a square that would box a disk. Its pages are of heavy cardboard, and around each page is folded a sheet of heavy paper with a circular opening in the center of each fold. This provides a pocket on each side of the page in which a record disk can be kept.

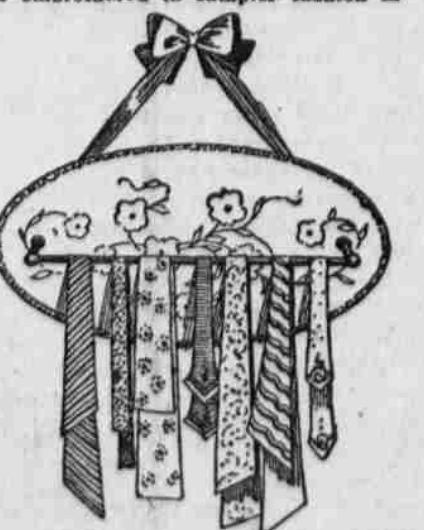

Necktie Holder.

Necktie holders are not new things in the way of gifts, but they have the advantage of being useful and always acceptable. The newest necktie holder that has been brought out for Christmas is oval in shape and about a foot or more in length. It is made of a stout piece of cardboard, which may be purchased already cut in the shops or cut by the maker of the offering, as desired.
