

LUMBER TRADE WILL BE LARGE

Coos County's Output Next Season Likely to Double Shipments Last Month.

The lumber shipments from Coos county during the month of November were second only to Columbia river shipments, according to figures contained in The Timberman. The shipments were not quite as heavy as during October but were nearly 15,000,000 feet for the month.

Next spring or summer when the C. A. Smith Company starts its present mill on a double shift and the new Bay City mill on a double shift, as is now planned, it will be cutting at the rate of 1,000,000 feet of lumber every day or rather in the twenty hours of each day that the plants will be running. This will make the output of the one company alone over 25,000,000 feet per month and as the other companies are planning for a big cut, the lumber cut in the county may run close to 35,000,000 feet per month.

Plans to Construct Million-Dollar Canal in Curry County.

The Portland Journal says: "Announcing that the money has been secured to carry its plans to completion, the Pacific City Canal Company filed articles of incorporation. It has a capital stock of \$1,000,000 and will construct a deep water canal from Lake Flores, in Curry county, to the Pacific ocean.

"The canal and the construction of a deep water harbor on Lake Flores at Pacific City is the chief project the company has in hand. It hopes, thereby, to build up a new city of importance and add another valuable harbor to the Pacific coast by private capital. Engineers have investigated the project and declared it feasible.

"George Stevenson, W. H. Lang and W. W. Purdy are the incorporators, L. B. Reeder filing the incorporation papers as attorney. Mr. Stevenson is a local business man, Mr. Lang is a real estate dealer, and Mr. Purdy is a civil engineer, connected with the Great Northern railroad.

"Included in the plans of the company is the laying out of townships, the sale of lands, construction of power lines for all purposes and the building of a railroad from Pacific City, about 50 miles in length."

Girl Finds Jap Husband Not Up to the Standard.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28.—That all is not happy in the wedded life of the daughter of Archdeacon Emery, who was Miss Helen Gladys Emery until she became Mrs. Gunjiro Aoki, by an alliance with a Japanese houseboy, is the story that has come to the ears of her former friends in this city.

It is said that no separation has as yet taken place between the young mother and her Japanese husband, but the life she chose when she went to live among the Japanese colony near Seattle, has proved beyond her powers of endurance.

Some days ago Archdeacon Emery received a letter from Seattle that caused him to leave at once to see his daughter, and it believed that steps will shortly be taken to effect separation and that Mrs. Aoki will return to her father's home with her baby. The story as it comes from the north is that Aoki has proved faithless to his vows that he made to love, honor and cherish the girl who became his wedded wife.

He has become shiftless and lazy, it is charged, and spends days at a time in the haunts of his Japanese associates in the city, leaving his wife until he is out of funds, when he returns to demand money from her.

For the protection of herself and her child she has been compelled to refuse him, and it is said that her unwillingness to give him all the money which has been sent her is the cause of angry words and even brutal treatment.
