FIRE IN BANDON.

BANDON, Ore., Dec. 29. — Fire broke out in the El Dorado building here last week, and for a short time the entire business section of Bandon was threatened, as the fire was very hard to get at, but prompt work on the part of the firemen soon had the flames under control. The fire was caused by the explosion of a gasoline tank, which Ernest Boak, a plumber, was attempting to solder. The tank was thought to have all the gasoline out of it. Boak was badly burned about the face and hands, his right hand being burned almost to a crisp. The nails fell off his fingers, and the hand will probably always be badly disfigured. His physician thinks, however, that the face burns are not so severe as to make a permanent disfigurement.

The El Dorado building is the property of Rasmussen Bros., two well-to-do men of this city. The damage to the building was light, and the loss was fully covered by insurance. It is a new building, having been constructed only last summer.
