

WARRANTS ARE COMING IN FAST

Treasurer Williams Redeems \$43,700 Worth in the First Two Days.

Marshfield old city warrants are being rapidly presented for redemption by their holders, Treasurer Williams paying off \$43,700 worth during the first two days. It is expected that nearly all of them will be presented this week with the exception of a few stray warrants held by parties who have forgotten for the time being that they held city securities. There are also a number of warrants held in San Francisco and these will be late in getting here.

From the bond buyers, Treasurer Williams received \$54,835 and he also had a small amount of city funds on hand so that the old securities will be pretty well cleared up. The outstanding warrants after the city receives its first installment of tax money next spring will be small if there is any.

It is expected that the paying off of the city warrants will create a demand for the special improvement bonds of the city. A number of the

holders of city warrants have no particular use for the money at present and want to reinvest it. The special improvement bonds are a better grade of securities than the warrants and are more desirable for the fact that the interest on them is payable annually and one tenth of the bonds must be paid off each year. This gives the holders of the special improvement bonds practically compound interest while the city warrants merely draw straight interest.

INVENTS AUTO THAT RUNS WITHOUT FUEL

SHERANDOAH, Pa., Dec. 29. — William Matrolls of New Philadelphia, near here, claims to have invented an automobile that runs without fuel, generating its power of propulsion from the air while the machine is in motion.

For three years Matrolls has been working on the problem behind closed doors, and has now announced that he has perfected his invention. The car, he explains, gathers its power from the air through the application of new mechanical principles. His invention, he says, will revolutionize the automobile industry.

OPEN SHERMAN AVENUE SOON

North Bend City Council Asks For Bids For Improving Thoroughfare.

At the meeting of the North Bend city council last evening, City Recorder Derbyshire was instructed to advertise for bids for grading Sherman Avenue to the south city limits of North Bend. It is proposed to push the improvement through as rapidly as possible and it is believed that the Marshfield city council and the county commissioners will continue the opening of the thoroughfare through Marshfield, making one of the finest and most beneficial drives that has been opened in this section.

The permanent grade of Sheridan avenue from Virginia to Washington street was also established in order that the sidewalks could be put in there at once. The street has been graded.

Next Monday night, the annual meeting of the North Bend council will be held and the newly elected mayor and councilmen will take the oath of office.

Special Election.

J. M. Blake, who is seeking a street railway franchise in North Bend, appeared before the council and discussed the matter generally. He stated that he expected to circulate petitions this week calling for a special election when the voters may pass upon the proposed franchise. The date of the special election is understood to be April 19. He stated that the petitions would be filed by next Monday night. The North Bend council has not taken any official action on the Blake project but are understood to be favorable to it.
