### REMEMBERED HIS PIONEER HOME

IN LINE WITH the editorial in last evening's Times on "Our Own Folks," the press dispatches tell another story where memory of by-gone days prove strong in later years.

By the will of the late A. Schwabacher of San Francisco, \$1,000 is left to the poor of Walla Walla. Mr. Schwabacher went to Walla Walla in 1862 and was prominent in business life there for nearly 30 years. He left the city about 20 years ago, but evidently retained fond memories of his former home.

Perhaps none of us realize how deeply our lives and actions are influenced by memory's subtle power. It transports us in a twinkling across the gulf of years, and swifter than flash of light carries us over seas and mountains to the scenes of other days.

The Walla Walla of 1862 was a very different town from the fine, substantial and prosperous city of the present day, says the Spokane Spokesman Review. When Mr. Schwabacher engaged in business there Washington territory had fewer people than now live in Walla Walla alone. There were no rail roads in the territory, no cities and nothing of luxury. Merchandise came by sea to Portland and was transported thence by boats and wagon trains to the interior. Money was scarce and prices high and the pioneers were glad to have the necessities of life and delighted with an occasional comfort.

But they contrived withal to extract a fair degree of happiness from life and in many ways are better men and women for the hardships they endured and the self-denials they were called upon to make.
