Overhaul Crafts.—The tug Astoria is again in service after undergoing a thorough overhauling. The steamer Reta is off its run for a few days undergoing an overhauling.

Start Shop.—Grant Eggers will open the barber shop in The Chandler the first of the year. The barber shop there had not been opened since the building was completed.

Remains Here.—The item that G. W. Carleton was going to make his home with his niece, Mrs. Huntley, in North Bend was erroneous. Mr. Carleton will remain in Marshfield.

Buy Lots.—H. P. Campbell, who recently bought the Timmerman property in Eastside, yesterday closed a deal for several more lots adjoining that property, taking over a considerable tideland that has been held by the East Marshfield Land

Company. This makes an investment of about \$15,000 by Mr. Campbell in property at the point. The deal was closed through the Stutsman agency.

Will Practise Alone.—H. G. Hoy, who has been connected with J. W. Bennett's law office for sometime, announces that he will open an office of his own in the Bennett and Walters block the first of the year and practise alone.

Breaks Water Main.—North Bend was waterless for a large portion of today owing to a big log at the Simpson mill being thrown against the water main and breaking it. The break was repaired as quickly as possible but caused much inconvenience to patrons there.

Goes to Bandon.—M. F. Flom, who has been identified with the Merchant & Kammerer store for sometime has resigned his position there and within a few weeks will go to Bandon to take charge of a store which he and R. A. Copple of the Golden Rule Store in Marshfield, will open there.

May Get Pardon.—Sheriff Gage stated today that he understood that Governor Benson would shortly take action on the petition asking for a pardon for Holland Anderson, the former Marshfield bartender, who is serving a term in the State penitentiary at Salem for murdering Mrs.

Gordon in Marshfield two years ago. The petition, Sheriff Gage understands, is to come up at the next pardon hearing.

Hawley Writes.—Congressman W. C. Hawley has written the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce that he has had one hearing before the Rivers and Harbors Committee of Congress at which he presented the needs of Coos Bay for an appropriation. He says the prospects are good that this waterway will be adequately provided for.

Thefts at Eastport.—Mrs. George Condie of Eastport, who was in Marshfield today, reports that petty thieving is causing considerable trouble in that neighborhood. Her chicken ranch among others has suffered from the marauders. It is believed that it is the same gang that has been doing petty thieving along the Marshfield waterfront.
