## BURIED ALIVE IN DEEP TRENCH

**Joseph Kenone Has Narrow Escape From Death at Bay City Mill.**

To be buried alive for five minutes and crushed under several tons of earth was the painful experience of Joseph Kenone, a workman employed at the old Bay City Mill, Tuesday. He was digging a trench for a foundation for part of the new construction at the mill when suddenly the bank caved in, covering him with about four feet of dirt. The other workmen escaped and at once set to work digging him out. About five minutes elapsed before he was removed and he was unconscious but respiration was quickly restored. He was bruised by the pressure of the dirt.

### BIG FRUIT UNION.

**Rogue River Valley Growers Plan New Association.**

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 6.—One big fruit growers' union for the entire Rogue River Valley district is planned by orchardists of Southern Oregon. A movement is under way for merging the Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass fruit growers' unions into one organization and it is proposed to give over to this body the packing and shipping of all fruit grown in the valley and also the buying of packing, spraying and other orchard materials direct from the factory in earload lots. The formation of such an organization will insure the uniformity of the pack and maintain the high reputation of Rogue River fruit. The proposed union is to be incorporated and its affairs will be handled by a board of directors and a manager.

## SHIPMENT OF STEEL RAILS

**Not For Construction of Drain Line But to Rebuild Local Road.**

The Czarina will bring about five miles of steel rails to Coos Bay this week and when the report got in circulation this morning, more railroad rumors were afloat than have been heard in many a day. However, General Manager Mills of the local line soon put a quietus on the rumors by announcing that the steel was for the reconstruction of the local line, heavier steel to replace the light rails now doing service.

The shipment has delayed the Czarina a couple of days and instead of getting out of San Francisco Monday, she will not sail until Thursday arriving in here Saturday, probably. The five miles of steel will be to replace the forty-five pound steel with 62 pound steel. The new steel will be put in largely on two and one-half miles of the Marshfield end of the road to Flagstaff.

The heavy steel will make a great improvement in the road and one that General Manager Mills has been desirous of securing for some time past. With light steel, it is impossible to ballast the road sufficiently to stand up solid during the rainy season.

### TALKS ABOUT FIGHT.

### LUMBER MARKET GOOD.

**Columbia River Mills Prepare For Heavy Trade.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—Loggers of the Columbia River expect the new year will see more raw material handled in their camps than ever before in the history of the industry within a similar period. The lumber trade is said to be booming and the coming year promises great activity. Many mills are short of logs and camps will resume operations in February instead of waiting for spring. New mills in the Columbia river district have drawn heavily upon the usual log supply until it is less than usual at this season of the year. Mills are said to be filled up with orders that will keep them busy for the coming three months.

### DOG CHEWS \$20.

**Landlady's Pet Grabs Bill and It Vanishes—Tenant Insists Rent Paid.**

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Jan. 6. — If a landlord's pet dog chews up and swallows a tenant's \$20 bill, with which the tenant had hoped to pay his rent, shall the tenant be required to make good the loss, or shall the landlord return him the difference between the \$20 bill and rent, which is \$11, and is the landlord's dog a responsible agent to receive money? These and other questions will have to be decided by Justice of the Peace George W. Riechmann after a trial.

The landlord involved is Mrs. Emma Madsen at 4258A Natural Bridge road, and the tenant, Joseph Bauman, who lives upstairs at the same address. The dog's name is Spitz.

Mrs. Madsen brought suit recently in the court of Justice Thomas P. Stanton to force Bauman to pay \$11 rent, due November 17. Bauman refuses to pay the \$11, declaring Spitz grabbed a \$20 bill which had been given his 3-year-old son, Metta, with which to pay the rent. Spitz chewed the money and swallowed it, or in some other manner caused its disappearance, Bauman claims. He insists that instead of he owing Mrs. Madsen \$11, she owes him \$9, the difference between the amount of the rent and the \$20 bill. The Baumans have refused to move until the case is decided.
