FIX MYRTLE POINT ROAD.

Douglas County to Repair Part of Its Highway.

ROSEBURG, Jan. 8.—C. M. Wilson, who was in town from Camas Valley, reports that road district voted a ten mill special road tax by the handsome vote of 31 to 2. That will raise a fund of about \$9,000 and assures the building of an excellent road. A new and much easier grade has been established over the Camas mountain, and with the other improvements will materially shorten the time for travel between here and Myrtle Point.

Forty of the forty-five road districts of this county which held special meetings for the purpose of voting special road taxes, voted in favor of same, the levies ranging from one to ten mills in the various districts. The five districts which decided against a special tax were mostly involved in some local controversy, such as proposals for dividing the district, or something of that nature, the majority of the voters in nearly every instance being in favor of a special tax. This shows that the county is nearly unanimously in favor of good roads, and also to the best method of getting them.

BANDON WANTS LINE.

Commercial Club There Starts Several Movements.

BANDON, Ore., Jan. 8.—The Bandon Commercial Club has instructed the secretary, C. R. Moore, to correspond with the district superintendent of the Western Union Telegraph Company with a view to getting a line direct to Bandon. At present, in order to send a message, it is necessary to telephone to Marshfield and have it sent from there. This not only adds expense but is the cause of many errors, owing to misunderstanding over the telephone. A Western Union wire into Bandon would be a paying investment to the company from the start, it is claimed. The club also took up a suggestion made by a visitor last Summer and instructed the secretary to communicate with the large timber holders in the watershed of the Coquille River to get them to interest the congressmen from their respective districts in various parts of the United States in an appropriation for this river. Many other matters of importance were discussed and an active campaign will be commenced for improvement along many lines.

MYRTLE POINT POINTERS.

News of Upper Valley From The Enterprise.

A petition for a bridge over the South Fork, near the T. M. Hermann home, was signed up some time ago, and the county court has gone as far as to have the county surveyor set stakes for the structure. But now a protest against the building of the bridge is being circulated and signed.

During the month of December the local postoffice received and dispatched on an average of 73 sacks and 23 pouches of mail matter each day, and this work was done without a single error being reported and without a single delay chargeable to the office force. As indicating the volume of Christmas business 2,000 registers passed through the office during eight days of the Christmas rush.

NOW WANT RAILROAD.

Myrtle Point Doesn't Want Line Across River.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "At a meeting of the Commercial Club the matter of granting concessions to the Coos Bay and Idaho railroad was brought up, it being deemed desirable that the company should be offered inducements to run the line down this side of the river rather than on the other side. Officers of the club were of the opinion that the company be satisfied to bring their survey through town provided a right-of-way was granted and a site for a depot given. After some discussion a committee was appointed to confer with the railroad people regarding their desires in the matter. This committee consists of Lloyd Spires, E. W. Hermann and S. C. Giles. During this week Chief Engineer Haines has had a force of surveyors engaged in and around Myrtle Point seeking out the best route for the railroad. They have already run a line down the other side of the river and are now working on this side, which would give rise to the belief that the company is ready to locate the track on this side provided the property owners do the right thing and that a feasible route can be found that would not be too expensive in construction. The people here are finally becoming aware that something must be done to induce the railroad to come in or it will either establish a rival town or have the depot placed at such a remote point that it would cost thousands of dollars in a few years time in transferring passenger and freight traffic."
