In Memoriam

DIED—Harold Burr Mills at Coos Bay, Oregon, Thursday, January 13, 1910. Born at Elmira, N. Y., August 7, 1882. Attended Forest Grove Academy and graduated from the Pacific University at Forest Grove, Ore., in 1902. Spent three years in United States service as mining engineer in Philippines. In senior year of engineering course at University of California at Berkeley. Surviving him are his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Mills, and sister, Miss Mable Clare Mills.

The passing of Harold Mills adds a particular and peculiar pathos to the Czarina tragedy for the people of Coos Bay. His death in such a tragic manner has brought the bitter cup of sorrow to the lives of friends and relatives. Death, ever surrounded with gloom is a greater grief when it comes in life's golden forenoon with all the possibilities of a glorious young manhood before it. Harold Mills was a young man of exceptional promise. A brilliant student in the engineering department of the University of California, his life work was yet before him. His courage and fortitude was shown in his clinging to the only mast on the doomed vessel to the very last. Silent watchers on the wreck strewn shore were able to recognize him through powerful glasses and they say he was one of the very last to abandon hope of rescue and did it only when it was his last chance. Life was sweet to him. Removing his coat he waved a fond farewell to those on the shore and plunged into the seething waters to rise no more.

The writer knew Harold Mills, not intimately but sufficiently to understand and appreciate his character and goodness—not goodness of the namby pamby kind but the good elements that go to make up a Christian gentleman. His was a heart of gold. He was one of nature's noblemen in its truest sense—brave, generous, manly with the kindly and kingly qualities of an ideal American. His was the soul of honor and his friends and friendships were sacred to him. That his career should close at the early age of twenty-six is one of life's tragedies.

To the broken hearted father, mother and sister, who sit in sorrow where his footsteps shall never again find echo, we extend our sympathy and the sympathy of the people of the entire community whose hearts are full to overflowing with grief and who share the burden of their bereavement and sorrow today.

"We saw not the lift of the curtain,

Nor heard the invisible door, As he passed where life's problems uncertain

Will follow and vex him no more.

We lingered and wept on the threshold—

The threshold each mortal must cross—

Then we laid a new wreath down upon it

To mark a new sorrow and loss."
