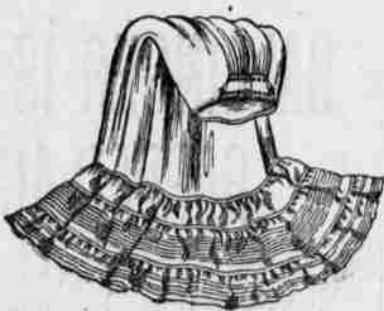

The Coquille mill will ship out 650,000 feet of lumber during the month of January. The lumber will be taken to Coos Bay by rail and shipped out over the bar at that place. The schooner Mayfair will take the lumber to San Francisco.
