NO MORE NEWS OF SHIPWRECK

Unknown Schooner On Beach
Near Rogue River With
All Sails Set.

No further details of the reported
wreck of the schooner San Buena
Ventura have been obtainable aside
from the confirming of the report that
an unknown schooner is ashore off
the mouth of Rogue River. With
all sails set, the waterlogged craft is
fast on the long beach. There were
no signs of life aboard her, accord-
ing to the latest information from
Gold Beach.

The telephone line between Gold
Beach and Port Orford is down and
has been down for about three
weeks. At Port Orford, they had re-
ceived only meager news of the dis-
aster and that was brought by a mail
carrier. He said that parties at Gold
Beach were sure the wrecked schooner,
which had been driven in Thurs-
day night, was the San Buena Ven-
tura although the rough surf had
prevented any boat getting out near
her.

The San Buena Ventura usually
carried a crew of seven men. This
time she loaded at Eureka for South
America and is thought to have
taken a larger crew than usual.

Various rumors concerning the
wreck were afloat in Bandon yester-
day but no one could be found who
had received any authentic informa-
tion other than is given in the Port
Orford report.

No place had reported the crew
getting ashore and it was doubtful
if they could in the storm that had
been prevailing. The only hope was
that they kept to sea and were pick-
ed up by a passing ship.

LOOSE BIRDS AT PARTY.

Several Hundred Canaries Float
Through Dance Room.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Jan. 17.—
Several hundred live canary birds,
floating through the room, gave an
enlivening touch to the ball which
Mr. and Mrs. George Harrison Fra-
zier gave at the Bellevue-Stratford
for their daughter, Miss Frazier, a
debutante of this season.

The birds were concealed in sev-
eral large balls of roses, which were
suspended from the ceiling. At the
stroke of midnight the balls were
opened and large quantities of con-
fetti sifted upon the dancers from the
other rose balls. The canaries, com-
ing down on the heads of the dan-
cers, were caught by them and plac-
ed in ribboned cages.
