Returns Home.—Eddie Leneve, who has been at the Oregon State Industrial school the past two years, passed through here yesterday en route home to Coquille.

Sprains Leg.—Ivy Noah, son of Ed. Noah, fell from a haymow the other day and sustained a badly sprained limb which will necessitate his using crutches for awhile.

Haines Better.—F. A. Haines, chief engineer of the Coos Bay and Boise Railway who has been ill at Roseburg with the grip, has recovered and has resumed work. Francis H. Clarke is now in Roseburg consulting him about the line.

Steps On Nail.—Dr. E. Mingus is laid up today with a very sore foot as a result of stepping on a rusty nail yesterday. He was wearing rubber boots while patrolling the beach for bodies from the Czarina wreck and stepped on spike in a piece of lumber that penetrated his boot and foot.

Hold Election.—The annual election of chief and assistant chief of the Marshfield Fire Department will be held in the department's quarters in the city hall, January 20, the polls being open from 7 to 9 o'clock in the evening. Only members of the department can vote. L. W. Traver is the only nominee for chief.

Papers Eagerly Sought.—F. W. Stevens came in yesterday from Coquille where he is in charge of the surveyors working on the Coos Bay and Boise Railway. He says that The Times was eagerly sought in Coquille last week, as high as fifty cents per copy being refused for the ones containing the account of the Czarina wreck. Good progress is being made with the survey.

Fire Scare.—Some refuse that worked through a hole in the floor left for a radiator pipe, began to smoulder in the First Trust and Savings bank building this morning and caused a little fire scare. The department was called out but Wm. Warwick had succeeded in extinguishing the threatened blaze before water was turned on. It is presumed that a cigar stub or spontaneous combustion started the fire.

Death Accidental.—Coroner Golden returned today from Bandon where he conducted an inquest over John Grennell, the mate of the Hugh Hogan who was killed Saturday night. The coroner's jury brought a verdict of accident, finding that he stepped off the wharf in the darkness and struck a hauser of the Hugh Hogan, breaking his neck and inflicting a severe scalp wound. His body was recovered from the water in about twenty minutes.
