NEW LIFEBOAT USELESS.

Tillamook Station Poorly Equipped to Grapple With Disaster.

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Jan. 20. — Nothing has been done to improve the life-saving station at Tillamook. The station was recently furnished with a boat of the same dimensions as the one damaged going to the wrecked steamer Argo and which capsized in the breakers, drowning one of the lifesaving crew and two female passengers from the ill-fated steamer. The new boat is perfectly useless to grapple with conditions which prevail here at times, and would place the lives of the lifesaving crew in danger whenever it attempted to cross out over the bar to aid a vessel in distress or to save the lives of passengers and crew.

This was fully demonstrated in the Argo disaster, for out of the five persons drowned the last lifeboat was the cause of three deaths, and it is a wonder that more were not drowned of the life-saving crew, which was in the breakers for an hour before it reached shore after the boat capsized. The station needs a bar and motor boat, and a team of horses as there is nine miles of beach to Nehalem Bay.

OIL KILLS DUCKS.

Oil Tank Steam Cleans Boilers In Inland Waters.

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 19. — Lovers of bird life and sportsmen are aroused by the death of countless ducks on Anderson Island and the Nisqually flats. Their eyes are bloodshot and wings and feathers glued tight to their bodies by a sticky substance, cleaned from the inside of an oil-tank steamer. As a result of this pollution of the waters, the birds cannot fly and they are starving by the thousands. The game warden of Pierce county went to their relief recently with grain. The tank-men guilty for this condition will be prosecuted, as it is against the law for them to befoul the water in such a way.

ORDER BOOKS FOR THE NEW LIBRARY

Arrangements Made to Install It In High School Building Temporarily.

As has been announced before, the Public Library Committee is preparing to make their first purchase of books which is to be installed for the present and temporarily only in a room leased from the directors in the High School building.

This list of books will be made up largely of encyclopedias and reference books, necessarily so, for two reasons: First, because they are always made the first object in any library, and second, because as they are never allowed to be removed from the library headquarters no system of loan or distribution is necessary—and consequently no regular librarian is required—which in the present situation of the library's affairs is of great importance. The Library Committee feels considerably richer through the timely action of the Progress Club which has just turned over to them the \$150 which was raised for the benefit of the library, through the efforts of the club over a year and a half ago. This will enable the committee to make a very good showing indeed, and they esteem the action of the Progress Club very highly as the money will be of much greater value to them now than later, when they confidently expect to have more. It is only a question of a short time when Marshfield will have a well equipped library in a central location.

PERKINS' NEW PLAN.

Roseburg Oil and Coal Promoter Will Enter Politics.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 20.—J. W. Perkins, the local coal mine operator, admitted that he was "seriously considering" becoming a candidate for representative from Douglas county. He is a Republican, favors the assembly plan and served in the legislature as a representative from Jackson county in 1907-08, when he was engaged in the fruit growing business near Medford. "If coal mining by my company is to be carried on extensively and successfully," said Mr. Perkins, "the present laws relating to such projects will have to undergo some changes. It would be my chief object to bring about such changes if I should go to the legislature again. I aspired to the legislature from Jackson county for the sole purpose of aiding horticultural legislation, and the laws that were enacted along that line were of tremendous benefit to the fruit growing interests of the state."
