THE TOLL OF THE SEA.

SHIPWRECK on a home coast is always more terrifying and tragical than in foreign seas. The toll in human life taken by the sea is the heavier when it is levied upon those whom we knew and honored and loved in life. It is thus that the wreck of the Argo on Tillamook bar, a little time ago, and of the Czarina at Coos Bay but now, came close to the hearts of our people. For the rest these tales of the sea are written in every disaster which has befallen seafarers since navigation first began to write its records on uncharted waters.

There are some calamities that are more terrible in contemplation than in reality. This, we are constrained to believe, is true of death itself in whatever form it comes. In this view the sea-belaguered victims of shipwreck, who loose their hold upon the rigging and drop into the raging waters, suffer less in the final stress of disaster than do their friends on shore, who in agonized helplessness see the sea swallow them up. The comrades that knew, and the friends and kindred who loved Harold Mills, whose life was lost in the wreck of the steamer Czarina last Thursday, suffered more in the disaster that befell, and the death that overtook him, than did he himself. As sung by Lucy Larcom, a gentle poetess of a past generation, who was in close touch with the sea, and its disasters to the fishermen who went out from the harbors of the bleak New England coast, to the fogs and gales of the Grand Banks of Newfoundland:

His was the anguish a moment tells, The passionate sorrow death quickly knells, But the wearing wash of a life-long woe Is left for the desolate hearts to know, Till hope drifts dead to its stagnant brim, Whose tides with the dull years come and go, Thinking of him.
