DAIRY FARM AS A MODEL.

BACK IN IOWA near the town in which the editor of The Times formerly resided, Des Moines, the sons of the late Martin Flynn one of the best stock farmers ever in Iowa, have converted the big farm which their father left them into a big dairy. They keep six hundred cows and supply a large part of that city with milk, good wholesome milk, produced along scientific lines and delivered under sanitary conditions. They conduct their business as business men and they are among the heavy advertisers in the Des Moines papers. They set forth in these statements to the public just how their business is managed and what they deliver to the consumers. By such methods they will be enabled to work up an exclusive business and the consumers will gladly pay even a trifle more for milk thus produced than for ordinary milk. In other words, they are building up a reputation as well as a dairy and a reputation goes a great ways—even in prize fighting.

There is in this dairy the germ of an idea. At the present time promoters are in the habit of organizing plantation companies to operate rubber and banana and orange farms a thousand miles away from home and hundreds of thousands of dollars have been invested in such plantations and ranches and farms and real estate. Very few such investments have come out right in the end.

How much better would it be for Oregon men to organize corporations to develop Oregon industries, making use of their own soil, enhancing its value and its productiveness and increasing the home population. There are just as many opportunities right here at home as there are at the ends of the rainbow, at which so many people are in the habit of looking for riches. The Flynn dairy farm in Iowa is an illustration of what can be done. There is an ever increasing demand for milk and cream and butter and the pork that can be manufactured as a side line from pigs fed on the refuse of the milk. If we had many such organizations in Oregon how much better off this state would be.

We want to commend this example to many others who are thinking of making investments. Let us get together right here in Coos county and work out some of the problems of production that are now so prominent on account of the increased consumption of the products of the farm and the dairy and the orchard. Let us organize in Coos county. Let us do business in business like ways, and all work together to make this section what nature intended it to be, the most productive and the greatest in riches and in happiness for all the people.

BETTER LIFE SAVING
SERVICE NEEDED

THE FRIGHTFUL loss of life through the wreck of the steamer Czarina has renewed the agitation for more adequate lifesaving equipment on the Southern Oregon coast. An effort is now being made to secure a lifesaving tug to be stationed at Coos Bay. From this point the tug would be in a position to

render assistance to vessels in distress, not only in the immediate vicinity of the station, but also at points north and south of Coos Bay. All of the lifesaving equipment which could be provided will not prevent foolhardy captains taking long chances and occasionally losing out, but even the act of a few of these captains do not warrant the government in withholding necessary equipment from localities where it may be needed. It was the fearful loss of life at the Valencia wreck that resulted in the stationing of a lifesaving tug at Neah Bay. Perhaps the awful sacrifice at Coos Bay may be followed by a similar improvement in the service along the southern coast.—Oregonian.
