Error in Tax List.—It seems that the tax list of the Coos county property owners who pay more than \$100 taxes, that was published in The Times recently was for last year instead of this. L. W. Oddy, one of

Sheriff's Gage deputies, was hired by The Times to compile the list for the present year and when it was received, it was presumed to be this year's instead of last year's. Assessor T. J. CRIPPLED GIRL IN QUEER PLOT.

Stole \$30,000 From Father's Bank in Attempt to Buy Husband.

CHICAGO, Jan. 26.—An unusual story was outlined in the criminal court here in the opening statement in the trial of eight Italians who are accused of conspiring with crippled, 17-year old Angelina Schiavone to rob her father, an Italian banker.
In his argument, Assistant State's Attorney Fleming told the jury that Francesco Schiavone, uncle of Angelina, three years ago told the girl to get all the money she could from her father's bank, to bring it to him and he would save it for her and when she had a snug amount she could marry his son, Michael.
The girl was employed in her father's bank and it is alleged that her thefts aggregated \$30,000 before she was detected. When money from the bank was found in her possession she told her object in taking it and declared that, being crippled, she feared she would be unable to marry and so had tried to win a husband with her father's money.
Michael Schiavone is lame and is five years the senior of his cousin, Angelina. The eight defendants to the conspiracy charge are all relatives of Pasquale Schiavone, the banker.
Angelina was also indicted and will have a trial separate from the relatives.

LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF PASSING INTEREST.

"Of all the quick results I ever saw, that want ad I had in The Times last night accomplished it," said Chas. Hicox today.

Want Ad Gets Dog.—"The Times hadn't been around to my place fifteen minutes when George Dindinger called up and said he had my hound. A half a dozen of us looked for the pup all day Sunday and yesterday, and didn't get a trace of him, but The Times found him. The pup had followed a trail down to the store and remained there all day when Mr. Dindinger took it home to keep it for the owner, knowing that someone would be looking for it soon. A half dozen people called me in a few minutes about stray dogs they had seen and I never knew there could be so many canines that looked alike."

"I just had a letter from Dan Starr who is wintering my horses at Boise and he writes that they are having the most severe weather there that has been known in years," remarked F. P. Norton this morning.

"He says there is sixteen inches of snow on the ground and that the sleighing has been excellent for the past five weeks. Coupled with the extraordinary cold spell, they have been in the throes of a fuel famine. This makes one feel like Coos Bay weather is pretty good after all despite the kicks on it that you frequently hear."

"I am going to get even with Dr. Dix and some more of them if it takes thousand years," remarked Frank Laise the other night as he recounted his duck hunting experiences of a week ago Sunday. "He and the rest of the party thought it would be nice to leave me out on an island near the inlet all Sunday night and came back to town leaving me on the little stretch of land with deep water between me and any house. On Monday, they had troubles of their own when they tried to rescue me from the predicament they had left me in. They hired one launch to come down get me, but it failed and came back. Two others did likewise and finally the fourth launch reached me."

"There are not many people, even in this section of the country where you have so much of it who know what an inch of rain means," remarked a government service man at the Chandler today. "Probably the best way to convey the meaning would be to give you the figures for a given space of ground, say an acre. An acre is 6,272,640 square inches. An inch of water on an acre is therefore 6,272,640 cubic inches. That amount, at 27 cubic inches to the gallon, equals 22,000 gallons, or 220,000 pounds, or 100 tons. An inch of rain is, rain falling at the rate of 100 tons to the acre."
