PIONEER IS STRICKEN.

Mrs. K. D. Gorham, Resident of Lampa Since 1855, Passes Away

The Coquille Herald says: "Sarah V. Gorham, wife of K. D. Gorham, of near Lampa, passed away on Friday at the age of 84 years, 9 months and 19 days. She was born in Logan county, Kentucky, April 2, 1825, and married to K. D. Gorham of the same state. To this union were born three daughters, two of whom died in infancy. The third was Mrs. Julia Randleman of this county, who still survives. There are six grand children and two great grand children born. After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Gorham lived in Kentucky until 1855, when they crossed the plains by ox team, arriving on the Coquille, May 24, 1855, after a perilous journey of seven months, when they took up a homestead near Lampa where they have resided until death separated them."
