STEAMER FARALLON WAS ON COOS BAY RUN

Vessel Wrecked Off Alaska Coast Pled Out of This Port For a Couple of Years in the 90s.

The steamer Farallon, which was wrecked off the Alaska coast, according to Saturday's press dispatches, formerly ran into Coos Bay. In 1895 and 1896, she was on the San Francisco-Portland run, stopping at way points and caused a steamship rate war of short duration. "Scantling Bob" Roberts, well-known on the Bay, was master of her then. For several years she has been on the northern run. "Scantling Bob" Roberts is now port captain for Homer Fritch & Company of San Francisco, owners of the Caramel, Homer and other boats. Otto Schetter was agent for the Farallon when she ran in here.

EATING OF MEAT TO END IN 10 YEARS

Savant Tells Woman's Club That Use of Flesh Food Is Dangerous.

PITTSBURG, Feb. 7.—"This no-meat agitation, if persisted in long enough, will result in the practical elimination of meat as a diet product," says Dr. Horace Fletcher in lecturing to Pittsburg woman's clubs. "It is my firm belief that meat will cease to be eaten in America in the next 10 years. By the continued eating of meat there is in time produced a condition known as auto-intoxication, which is akin to alcoholic poisoning, and just as fatal in its effects."

"Meat is nowise needed in the economy of the body. In fact, in every test I have made it has been found to be positively deleterious."
