GARDINER PIONEER DEAD.

Mrs. Melvin, Long Resident of Coast, Passes Away.

GARDINER, Ore., Feb. 8.—Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Melvin, who died here recently aged 73, was born in Philadelphia, October 15, 1836. She came to the Pacific Coast with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Toek, by way of the Isthmus of Panama, settling in Crescent City in 1859, where she was married to Mr. Millan Melvin in 1858. She removed to Jackson county in 1861, to Canyonville, Douglas county, in 1868, and to Gardiner, November 11, 1870. Her husband died November 15, 1894.

Mrs. Melvin was the mother of ten children, nine of whom survive. They are: Mrs. H. Hanson and Mrs. Louis Seymour of Gardiner, Ore.; N. T. Melvin of Oregon City; M. M. and A. A. Melvin, of Portland; H. B., of Nome, Alaska; A. B., of Gardiner; W. C., of San Mateo, Cal.; and G. J., of Bay Center, Wash.

SUSLAW RIVER FAVORED.

War Department Recommends Appropriation of \$125,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 8.—The War Department has recommended to Congress a \$426,000 improvement of the Suslaw River in Oregon, conditional on local co-operation.

SAYS LIVING IS CHEAPER THAN TEN YEARS AGO

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—The cost of living has gone down instead of up, according to the arguments made before the New York Traffic club by Prof. Joseph French Johnson of the university of New York. He based his contention on the ratio between the increase in the world's gold supply and the appreciation of prices.

"Meat," said the professor, "is actually cheaper than it was ten years ago, taking into consideration the decrease in the value of the dollar. The more gold you have in the world, the less a given amount of it will buy. Now, the amount of gold has gone on steadily increasing, with an accompanying decrease in the value of the dollar, but that decrease, as measured by current prices has not yet caught up with actual basic conditions. A dollar today buys more than it is worth. I will give you a few figures to prove my point.

"A pound of porterhouse steak cost 20 cents in 1900 and today it costs 25 cents. Therefore the increase in the cost of meat is only 25 per cent, whereas if it had kept up in proper ratio to the value of the dollar, which is 40 cents cheaper than it was ten years ago, that increase would also have been 40 cents."
