NEW PHONE COMPANY.
Stockholders of Farmers Lines Meet in Coquille.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Coquille Valley Telephone Company which took place at the court house last Saturday was attended by over seventy-five stockholders and an enthusiastic meeting resulted. The business of the day was conducted behind closed doors, so a complete report of the doings is impossible, but that they had a good meeting and that the results were fully satisfactory so far as the work was completed was testified to by the satisfied look on the faces of those who attended the meeting."
"The officers and directors for the ensuing year were elected and considerable other business was transacted, but the meeting was much shorter than was desired and much business was necessarily postponed owing to the fact that the boats left so early that the time was too short."
"The officers are as follows: President, H. L. Stephens; Secretary, Frank E. Willard; board of directors, H. L. Stephens, K. H. Hansen, Chas. Barklow, George A. Morgan, J. D. Clinton, W. M. Kay and Frank E. Willard."

"At the present time this company has all the public farmer lines in the valley on their list of subscribers and there are but three of the private lines still disconnected. The board is reasonably certain of enrolling the subscribers on these three lines in the very near future. The company also has a great many subscribers in Coquille, and Myrtle Point who have agreed to have connections and instruments on the new company's lines when they are installed. This will work considerable of a hardship on the old company, but the result has been foreseen for over a year as the farmers contend that they have not had the service to which they are entitled nor the treatment which they should have received from the old company."

Coos County Seat Events As Told By The Sentinel.
Iz Dunham, connected with the North Pacific Steamship Company which is operating the steamer Newport, arrived in Coquille the first of the week and will remain for several days, transacting important business for his company.
