the beginning. People all say: "We never saw it in this fashion before." Well, it's getting out that "Whirlwind Dan" is here.

"What shall it profit a man if he gains the whole world and loses his own soul?" This was the question that Mr. Shannon raised last night in the tabernacle. Surely it is unanswerable. "Men are losing their souls because of gold," said he, "money is a good servant, but it is certainly a hard master. Men are judged today by their financial standing. This is wrong rating. It is true that men are all wrapped up in real estate and getting a living. They say, 'the world owes me a living' I tell you, you are wrong. You owe the world a life. What are you living for anyway? What are you saving up your money for, to pay funeral expenses? I tell you, what, there are no pockets in a shroud. When you are about to die, why don't you call for the banker to bring your gold, let them bring your deeds, your bonds and your wealth and let it comfort you in death. That's what you lived for. 'What shall it profit a man, Oh, what shall it profit a man.'"

"Do you know what a soul costs? You don't or you would not barter it off so cheaply. I'll tell you that a soul costs the heart aches of the Son of God. It cost him to hang on the cross. It cost him the bitter cup in the garden. It cost him the heavy lashes laid on his bare back. It cost him the cruel nails. It cost him the crown of thorns. It cost him the carrying the heavy cross under which he fell seven times. It cost him shed blood. It cost him a broken heart, for that was the real cause of his death. I tell you, oh, sinner that God blocks the way to Hell by the crimson cross. I will add to the cost of a soul, the bodies of the martyrs; which if piled would make a mountain higher than the Himalayas. Their blood would make a river as wide as the Amazon. I will add every dollar expended to save men (this should not be mentioned), every tear, the energy of the evangelist and I will lay on top of all this his very soul! all this for the redeeming of lost souls."

In the closing prayer, Mr. Shannon mentioned every public man in town all the sailors and longshoremen, no one was omitted. It was a remarkable prayer and revealed Mr. Shannon's real interest in all. No one could have gone from the great meeting last night feeling otherwise than that Dan is here for souls and not money. No one could honestly feel hard at him for what he said.

ARE BUYING MORE PLANTS

H. M. Bylesby & Co., of Chicago, Securing Public Utilities—Spend Large Sum

The Portland Journal says: "With the struggle centering in the Washington cities of Vancouver, North Yakima and Walla Walla, a fierce war of finance for supremacy in the gas and electric lighting business of the northwest, has begun between H. M. Bylesby & Co., of Chicago, Ill., and the General Electric Company, which recently purchased the Portland Gas Company.

"Following the purchase of the Olympia Gas and Power Company of Olympia, Wash., Tuesday by the Bylesby interests, after a hard fight, the scene of battle has shifted to Vancouver, Wash. And in the meantime both great interests have opened negotiations for the purchase of the North Yakima and Walla Walla gas plants.

"Within the last six months H. M. Bylesby & Co. have obtained control of the Northwestern Gas Company of Everett, Wash., Tacoma Gas Company of Tacoma, Wash., the Olympia Gas & Power Company of Olympia, Wash., and the Coos Bay Light & Power Company of Coos Bay, Ore. Franchises have been obtained for lighting plants in Chehalis, Wash., and Centralia, Wash. The General Electric Company has control of the Astoria Gas Company of Astoria, Ore., and recently acquired the Portland Gas Company.

Will Spend \$250,000.
"It was further announced that about \$250,000 would be spent on the Coos Bay plant, which was purchased several weeks ago, and which will be extended to take in all the cities on the bay. Twenty miles of mains will be laid.

"H. M. Bylesby & Co. form one of the largest concerns operating gas and electric lighting plants in the United States. The company has a monopoly on gas and electric companies in the new state of Oklahoma, and has plants scattered about in all sections of the country. Independent of combined interests, it is backed by a coterie of Chicago bankers."

MILLS BANK HONORS OLD DRAFT

Issued 52 Years Ago, Turns Up at Sacramento Institution.
SACRAMENTO, Cal., Feb. 21.—A draft for \$100 issued in this city on October 27, 1858, by the bank of D. O. Mills & Co. has just been returned to that institution by Seeley Gridley of Libertyville, Ill., administrator of the estate of his father, George Gridley. It was found in his effects after his death.

The draft was issued to George Gridley, payable by the American Exchange Bank of New York, an institution long since out of business. It bears in the upper right hand corner a picture of a side wheel ocean liner and in the lower left hand corner a picture of a clumsy sailing vessel.

The bank here referred to its old records and found the draft correct. A check on a Chicago bank for the amount of the draft has been forwarded to Gridley. The draft itself will be preserved as a curiosity.

CULIN'S BOAT SMASHED.

Coquille Physician In Collision On The Coquille River.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "What might have been a serious accident occurred on the river just above the city dock Monday morning. The Wolverine was coming down the river to the dock preparatory to starting on her regular run down the river. Dr. Culin with his gasoline boat was lying in the eddy just above the dock. As the Wolverine rounded the bend at the mill the doctor started across the river. He miscalculated the distance and the speed at which the Wolverine was traveling and the result was a nasty collision in which his boat was badly stove up near the stern and came very near being capsized. The accident would have been far more serious had not Captain Willard noticed the small boat through the driving rain and thrown his wheel hard to port thus barely striking the smaller craft. The repairs on the doctor's craft are not completed and the boat is not yet in service."

CULLINGS OF COQUILLE.

Coos County Seat News As Recorded By The Sentinel.

Married—In this city on the 12th inst.—Martin Dahl and Margarette Wilson, Judge E. G. D. Holden officiating. The happy couple are among Coos county's most worthy people, whom may long life and prosperity attend.

Sixteen-year-old Howard Moody is the champion fisherman of this city. He won the honor Thursday morning by landing a ten and three-fourths pound steelhead with an ordinary bamboo pole. The fish made a game fight but the boy was the stronger of the two and dragged his prize to shore and landed him. This is the largest fish caught with hook and line this season. Bert Seal reported a ten-pounder a week or two ago and several other good catches have been made. This year promises to be a record-breaker in the way of catching big fish.

Seeley & Anderson have reopened their logging camp on the lower river. The intention when they closed down was to go on the upper waters of the Coquille for the balance of the season, but new arrangements have been made and they started operations on a six-hundred acre tract of timber at Seven Mile Monday. They expect to put in about 12,000,000 feet of logs during the coming season. The logging is being done for the Lyons-Johnson Lumber Company at Prosper and for the Johnson Lumber Company just above this city.

Last Saturday the little son of Ralph Schroeder, living near Arago, while playing with his dog was so severely injured that several stitches were necessary to dress his wounds. In some manner while they were playing one of the dog's teeth caught inside the boy's mouth and the result was that the entire cheek was torn open and the lower lip was also badly lacerated. No one was present at the time of the accident but those near seem to think the boy and dog were merely playing and that it was purely accidental. The boy is doing nicely and so serious results are apprehended.
