She Differs for good-sized families. From In a recent lecture she said: "Fewer but better children is my

plea; better care for those that are now on earth, and at least give them a taste of the knowledge that their youth and unbiased minds cry for."

Mr. Roosevelt's doctrine is misinterpreted. He saw, as every close observer must see, that small families are predominant among the wealthy and well-to-do classes, and that in a great majority of cases the large families have come to parents who are incapable of giving their children proper support, education and moral training. His appeal for large families was addressed to that growing class of wives and husbands, who, from selfish motives, shirk a duty to society and the state. It is from this class that we hear most of this soothing doctrine of "fewer but better children."

A great many pampered and spoiled children are being reared by fathers and mothers who live up to that theory. As a rule a child that is reared without brothers or sisters in well-to-do and indulgent homes, is unfortunate and to be pitied. If it isn't developed into a mollycoddle, the escape must be attributed to its own innate goodness, and if selfishness is not bred into its character, it will be a wonder.

The child that does not early learn that parental care and tenderness must be shared with brothers and sisters, is in danger of being taught wrong lessons of life and duty. Many such are made the victims of all sorts of fads and new-fangled theories, picked up here and there by their well-meaning but foolish parents who spend a large part of their time chasing "new thought" of one variety or another, when their efforts might better be employed in acquiring knowledge from the wisdom of the ages.

Many a boy and girl that would develop into useful citizenship if reared intelligently and taught lessons of self-denial and duty, is being incapacitated for life's realities by deluded fathers and mothers, chiefly mothers, who have taken up the pleasing doctrine that better children can be reared when parents have only one or two than can be reared in homes where the virtues of self-denial and duty are impressed daily on youthful minds.
