VALE TO COOS BAY.

A RUMOR apparently pretty well founded is in circulation that the Harriman interests, still so-called, prompted by the acquisition by the Hill interests of the Willamette valley electric lines, will rush from Vale to Coos Bay via Burns and Drain. This, confirmed, will be another big piece of very good news for Oregon. This road, in addition to those already building in Oregon, will give nearly all parts of the State the transportation facilities and the spur to development that have been so long ardently desired and disappointingly deferred. Already new settlers are coming into Crook, Harney and other hitherto railroadless counties by thousands, and these are but the advance guard of the army that will come within the next few years. This rumored road would add much to the area thus rendered desirable for settlement and susceptible to development, and would attract tens of thousands more new residents throughout the long distance between the points mentioned. This result, if it is brought about soon, will be indirectly due to the invasion of Oregon by the Hill forces, to which Oregon already owes much and will probably owe far more.—Portland Journal.
