JOHN SNEDDON has received his commission of appointment as census taker and has been assigned the district of West Coquille. Work is to be commenced April 15th.

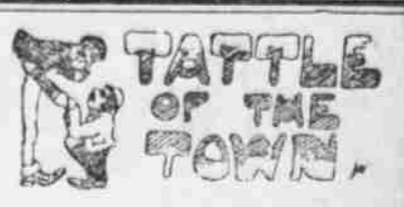
GEO. W. SHELLEY leaves on the Plant for San Francisco to join Mrs. Shelly, who is returning from an extended visit with relatives and friends in the East.
