**COMET NOW
ABOUT DUE**

**Heavenly Visitor May Be Seen
By Early Risers on Clear
Mornings.**

If you get up very early some of these mornings and look towards the spot where the sun will rise, if it is clear, you may possibly get a faint glimpse of the long looked for and much discussed Halley's comet. According to Father William F. Riggs, professor of astronomy of Creighton university at Omaha, Nebr., and one of the foremost astronomical authorities in the country, the comet will be visible to the naked eye, altho it is very near the sun.

If the tail of the Halley comet is over 15,000,000 miles long, the earth will pass through that tail on May 18, in the night. From revolving about the sun in opposite directions, the earth and comet are now rapidly drawing together. Today they are about 100,000,000 miles apart, but on May 18 they will pass, the comet between the earth and the sun and distant from us only 15,000,000. If its tail is that long it will sweep over us, and as astronomers agree that it is much longer, we may confidently expect the phenomenon. With a single exception astronomers declare we will experience no sensation, but that exception, Flammarion, predicts disaster.

Toward the middle of April, the comet should be plainly visible in the eastern sky before sunrise, its greatest elongation to the right or west of the sun occurring about May 8, when it will rise two hours before the sun. It will then for ten days move with increasing speed toward the sun until it passes it on May 18, being lost in all its rays a few days before and after that time.

After that it will be visible in the evening sky, separating at first very rapidly from the sun, and then more and more slowly until the early part of June, when it will approach the sun again and gradually disappear from view.
