A THOROUGH CLEAN-UP.

HUNDREDS of piles of rubbish that have been raked together during the past few days in answer to the clean-up summons shows that the people of the city have responded loyally to the call. It is to Marshfield's credit that they have done so. Furthermore the result shows that some good work has been done by the city officials and by the laides and others, who have been named upon the clean-up committees.

Now it remains to see to the carting away of the rubbish and to the prosecution of those who have failed to do their duty. Unless the city does take after the negligent ones the real benefit of the crusade will be lost. It is from the dirt that is left that the epidemics result. It is up to the city authorities to see that there is none left.

KEEPING UP STEAM.

THE BIG engines in the Steamships that ply in and out of Coos Bay keep up steam even when they are lying at the dock. The idea is to have the engines in readiness for service when needed. The call may come suddenly and an engineer would not like to be caught with a cold boiler.

Now it so happens that the bulk of the business men of this city are live ones. They usually have up a full head of steam and whether there is much to do or not they are ready for action. They are enterprising and aggressive. To those men Marshfield owes its reputation for being a bustling, prosperous town.

But there are some few business men in Marshfield who do not carry enough steam to haul a rowboat on flood tide. Because business in their lines may be a trifle dull they mope and moan. They don't work for business. They won't even advertise. They let the whiskers grow upon their faces and the cobwebs in their show windows. When a customer enters one of these places he has to hunt up the proprietor or a clerk. If he asks how business is he will be told that it is 'on the bum' and that the town is dead. He will leave such an establishment with the idea that he has been in the House of Misery.

It is a fact that Marshfield gets some very bad advertising from just such people as this. It is not right either. It is not right at all that the good, vigorous boosting work that is done by the hustlers of the town should be offset by this persistent pessimistic griping. Besides it only injures the man who gripes. If a man is sick it does him no good to think and talk constantly of his ailment. He should get out in the sunshine and try to think he is feeling well even if he is not. It is largely a psychological proposition anyway. Steam up and then see how you feel.

FIRE CAUSED
\$18,000 LOSS

Besides the fresh water streams and the streams from the Ice and Cold Storage company's own fire fighting apparatus.

There was very little wind, a mild southeast breeze prevailing. Soon after the fire was discovered, the ammonia condenser on the roof exploded, knocking down the smoke-stack.

Through Mr. Nicholson's personal guidance, water was frequently thrown over the ammonia tanks in the ice department and an explosion there prevented.

Through a salt water sprinkler system on the roof and a heavy coating of fire-proof roofing material, the fire was kept pretty well within the building.

Many cinders were blown on to the roof of the O. C. & N. warehouse occupied by F. S. Dow, but the salt water streams prevented the building catching fire. The asphalt coating of the roof was melted in many places but the cinders did not burn through.

The fire department was augmented by many volunteers, an unusually large number turning out in response to the alarms.

Damage in General.

The damage is general and greater than would appear to the casual observer of the ruins. The condensers, pipes, some of the pumps, etc., were totally destroyed. The extent of the damage to the engines and boilers cannot be ascertained. While some of the walls are standing, it will be necessary to tear them down and rebuild them as the water, ashes etc., have ruined the installation.

This morning, Mr. Nicholson wired the insurance adjusters for a permit to clean up and repair as much of the place as possible immediately as a few hours will make a vast difference in the extent of the damage to the machinery.

Blow is Hard One.

Much sympathy was expressed around town today for Mr. Nicholson by his many friends. The blow falls largely on him. He has labored hard to give Coos Bay one of the best cold storage plants along the coast and has met with some serious reverses previously through fires and accidents. He had just had the plant overhauled and prepared for one of the biggest seasons he had ever handled.
