POPE EXPRESSES REGRET

Sorry That Audience With Roosevelt
Didn't Take Place.

(By Associated Press.)

ROME, April 7.—Some of the
prominent ecclesiastics who were
revelled by the Pope today managed
to introduce the subject of the Roose-
velt incident. To these the Pontiff
expressed the deepest regret that he
had been prevented from meeting the
former President, but he gave no ut-
terance or opinion regarding the ne-
gotiations or deadlock that followed.

The incident continues to be a live
topic of popular discussion and is
emphasized by what the Liberal
press calls "The New Mistake" of
Merry Del Val who had prevented
the choral society of Cologne being
received by the Pope because the so-
ciety visited the quirkinal and sang
before the Italian sovereigns in spite
of the fact that every year hundreds
of persons are received by the King
Victor Emmanuel and afterward ad-
mitted to the presence of the Pope.

TAFT DOES NOT REPLY.

President Denies Indiana Politics
Bothered Him.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7. —
President Taft has not yet replied
to telegrams from Indianapolis urg-
ing him to reconsider his decision not
to visit that city May 5. To callers
at the White House, Taft declared
politics had nothing to do with his
decision.
