

COOS ROAD TO COMPLETION

Meeting of Officials of Rapid Transit Company Held Last Night.

A meeting of the directors of the Coos Bay Rapid Transit Company was held in North Bend Wednesday evening to check up data on the project and also investigate the backing and to make arrangements for hurrying it to an early consummation if possible. Practically all of the directors including E. D. McArthur, Dr. Leslie and Chas. Stauff of Marshfield were present.

"We found everything all right and are satisfied with it and will do all we can in our power to hasten its completion" said W. P. Evans, president of the company today. "The directors and myself were satisfied about the outside money to build the road being obtainable just as soon as the franchises here are secured. No, we cannot at this time give out who is financing the project but they are fully responsible and able to carry it out."

"We are not urging and will not urge anyone here to take stock in the company. However, we all have taken stock and are willing that others on Coos Bay should take some if they are satisfied with our judgment."

Mr. Evans further announced that an endeavor would be made to have the North Bend council take the franchise up for its third and final reading at its meeting next Tuesday evening.

It is stated that Major Kinney is going ahead with the work on his portion of the right of way, clearing ground and doing other work. Some of the surveyors of the proposed road were at work in West Marshfield this morning.

TWO INSURANCE POLICIES

Two Companies Carried Risks on Cold Storage Plant.

The total insurance on the Coos Bay Ice and Cold Storage Company's plant, including the various buildings and fixtures, was \$7,500. This covered the office which was not harmed. The German-American of which Henry Sengstacken is the local agent had one policy on it for \$1,500 and the New York Underwriters of Hartford, of which Otto Schetter is the local agent, had \$6,000. Part of the latter is thought to have been divided among other companies.
