HARBOR OF COOS BAY.

THE ACTION of Port of Coos Bay Commission in establishing wharf lines and defining the limits of a large harbor is one that will meet with popular approval.

Nature has given Coos Bay a great natural harbor, and this should be jealously guarded, protected and developed. It is the one great asset of this section. It has made possible all the development that has taken place. With its continued improvement railways will be compelled to come.

The 1400 foot channel is only a starter if Coos Bay is to become what many men of wide experience and ripened judgment predict—a really great harbor. C. A. Smith whose active operations have so greatly increased the commerce of this port as to attract outside attention says the slogan of Coos Bay should be a harbor a mile and a half wide. The limited water front of Coos Bay will make ships necessary for docking large ships if the ports commerce ever develops according to expectations. It is impossible to make these provisions at the present time but all improvements should be made with the larger purpose in view at all times.

There need be no rush nor extravagance nor untenable procedure. Things should be watched and warded and met in the order and sequence and within the rational limits of expansion as that expansion shall justify itself and the commission, and what is done should be done for the positive, approved and permanent good of Coos Bay and at well considered and well accounted cost.

WESTERN BRAIN SUPERIOR

There is, at least, one University of Chicago professor who has been able to say something worth while and that stamps him as a man of judgment and intelligence. Prof. Charles Zubelin is quoted as saying: "The east is old and the west is young," said the professor. "Youth out there is written in the landscapes as well as in the faces of the people.
