The city recorder was instructed to ask for bids for the following improvements:

Virginia avenue from Sherman to Harrison.  
Widening Virginia from Sheridan to Waterfront.

Improving California from Sheridan to water front.

The council declared its intention of improving Sherman between Washington and Ohio streets at a cost of \$9,850. It is to be planked from Washington to the crest of the hill and parked most of the way.

The city engineer was instructed to prepare plans and estimates for a sewer near North Bend ball park.

Also for improving Ireland, Delaware and Ohio streets between Sherman and Sutherland.

Also plans for cementing piling underneath the city wharf.

An application from the Coos Bay Motor Boat Club to have the North Bend council pay part of the expense of dredging a harbor for launches near the North Bend condensary was referred to a special committee.

The North Bend marshal was instructed to hire a dog catcher who is to round up all the canines in North Bend on which a license has not been paid. He will begin work in a few weeks.

**PROTEST MADE ON ASSESSMENT**

"Sawdust Flat" Property Owners Object to Paying Over \$3 Per Yard For Paving.

Property owners on Commercial avenue and on some other streets in the "sawdust" flat district are protesting against the deficit assessments which the city council has levied on the paving done there last summer. R. C. Cordes, E. A. Anderson, Judge Coke, F. A. Sacchi and others are said to have declared their intention of fighting the deficit assessment in the courts.

The deficit assessment is stated to be about ten per cent of the original assessment. The property owners are protesting against the high cost of the paving. According to their figures, the Coos Bay Paving and Construction Co. will, with the deficit assessment, receive at the rate of \$3.12 1/2 per square yard for the paving or at the rate of \$2.87 1/2 per square yard without the deficit assessment. They claim the latter is considerably higher than City Engineer Sandberg estimated the work originally, his estimate being \$5.15 per front foot while under the assessment and deficit the assessment is about \$6.25 per front foot.

Some of the property owners claim to have been given to understand by a representative of the Coos Bay Paving and Construction company before the work was done that the paving would not cost to exceed \$2.25 per square yard and hence their ire when Marshal Carter tried to collect the deficit assessment yesterday.

Property owners on the west portion of Commercial avenue who had their work done under a separate project are understood to have escaped the deficit assessment owing to the company's recent rebate, their paving being even more costly than the east portion of the street.

**BITULITHIC IS REDUCED.**

Portland Gets Reduction of 15 cents A Square Yard.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 13. — Mayor Simon has secured a reduction of 15 cents a square yard on bitulithic pavement. Representatives of the Warren Construction company held a conference with him in his office at the city hall. For this class of work the lowest rate yet quoted was \$2 a yard. The new price will be \$1.85.

Bitulithic has ranged in price from \$2 to \$2.50 a yard for the past few years. It is laid in Portland by the Warren Construction company and the Pacific Bridge company. A great amount has been ordered. It is considered an excellent material, and Mayor Simon's reason for demanding a reduction was that he believed the companies had been charging too much.

Rates on all kinds of paving have now been greatly reduced since Mayor Simon entered office. Competition that was threatened by eastern bidders on asphalt paving helped to put down the price on this material so that it is now being laid as low as \$1.44 a yard. It has ranged as high as \$2.40 in the past few years.

Hassam pavement is facing competition also and a reduction would not be surprising. Concrete specifications have been ordered by the council on certain streets, which indicates that an effort is being made in the council to force this brand of paving to lower prices.
