TO GIVE CITY PUBLIC PARK

Councilman Hennessey May Dedicate Tract Near Eastport For Purpose.

The city of Marshfield may acquire a city park free and it may be called "Hennessey Park."

This was the talk at the city council this week. Councilmen Hennessey said that if things pan out as he expected, he would offer the city a tract of about thirty acres for a city park providing the city would do a certain amount of work getting it in proper shape for a park. He said it was located near Eastport but further than this he did not divulge his plan. The councilmen have been talking for sometime of taking steps to secure land for a city park and have been wondering where they could secure a desirable tract in a good location and how they could pay for it.

When councilman Hennessey suggested that he might be the donor of a tract, Councilman Powers told him to go ahead and he would see that the park was named "Hennessey's Park" in honor of the donor. Further than that, Mr. Powers said that he would personally do as much work towards improving it as Councilman Nelson, but Nelson said he couldn't do very much. Councilman Albrecht said he would give a week's work to it.

However nothing definite was done about it.

Oppose Expense.

"I wish you would call attention to the fact that I voted against allowing the Mayor to hire additional policemen" said Councilman Nelson today. "I made a motion that the bawdy houses be moved outside the city, but the Mayor said I was out of order. So when the motion was made to close the houses and empowering the Mayor to hire additional policemen, I voted against it. I was in favor of closing them but I don't think it was necessary to incur any more expense in case the present police do their duty."

O'Kelly is going merrily on today and Major Kinney's hack line is doing quite a business with the five-cent fare between here and North Bend. Capt. O'Kelly says that Kinney is a great starter, but a poor finisher, he isn't worrying any about the outcome.
