SPECIAL ROAD MEN SELECTED

County Court Decides to Engage Special Roadmasters For Districts

Instead of hiring a good roads engineer for the entire county, the Coos county commissioners at Coquille this week decided to engage special roadmasters only for those districts which have raised special funds for improving the roads. There was considerable discussion about turning the road improvement over to one man until the commissioners are certain they have a man capable of filing the job.

The following special supervisors were named:
Joe Larson for the Allegany district.
H. E. Wilcox for the districts No. 11, 12, and 30 on the Coos Bay. Wagon road known as Brewster and Fairview.
E. H. Kern for districts No. 16 and 17 known as Coquille and Gravel Ford.
H. H. Bronson for districts No. 18 known as Bridge.
John Mumford for District No. 25 known as Hall's Creek.
R. P. Carmon for district No. 26, known as the South Fork.

Bids were also ordered asked for the construction of the bridge across the South Fork of the Coquille. The cost of the structure is estimated at \$8,000.
The county court rejected offers to buy the county stone crusher and decided to operate the plant again this year themselves. They are now arranging with the local railroad for the shipment of rock to various points along the line to aid in the construction of roads.

CASTAWAY IS RESCUED.

Schooner Bandon From Coos Bay Picks up Barge.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—Clinging to a half-submerged barge which was drifting through the Golden Gate, Robert Dakl, was rescued by the schooner Bandon after three life-saving crews had failed to attach a line to the boat. The barge broke loose from a tug that was towing it down the bay and the strong ebb tide carried it rapidly toward the sea. The "rip" was running so strong that the life-saving crews could not reach the barge, but the Bandon, which was entering the gate, fastened a line to the derelict and removed Dakl from his perilous position.

CHINESE MOB DOES DAMAGE

Destroys Mission Property And Forces Foreigners to Flee for Their Lives

(By Associated Press.)
HANKOW, April 15.—The situation in Changsha is grave. The rioting was begun by natives in revenge for the action of the Chinese officials in cornering and controlling the export rice. Considerable property has been destroyed and missionaries and other foreigners had to take refuge aboard merchant steamers. The British consulate and customs offices have been abandoned. British gunboats are on the scene and are being reinforced by two more. No fatalities are reported. Most of the property destroyed belonged to missions of various denominations.

AGED IOWAN TOURS EUROPE.

William Lake of Clinton, Aged 85, Starts On Long Trip.

CLINTON, Ia., April 13.—William Lake of this city, aged 85 years believes he is never too old to enjoy himself, and that a man is never older than he feels. Therefore he leaves for a 12,000 mile trip through foreign countries, in company with his grandson, Fred Lake. When young, Mr. Lake sailed on the high seas for many years, and has visited many parts of the world. He has not smelled salt air, however, for more than thirty years, and is as eager as a school boy to cross the Atlantic. The itinerary of the aged man and his grandson will include Spain, Italy, Egypt, Greece, the Holy Lands, Switzerland, France and the British Isles, and they expect to be absent six months.

TRADING STAMPS WIN.

ST. PAUL, Minn., April 16.—The State Supreme Court in an opinion in the case of Attorney General Simpson versus the Perry-Hutchinson company, a trading stamp concern, dismissed the writ in the suit to enjoin the company from continuing to issue trading stamps. The court held that trading stamps did not contain a sufficient element of chance to bring them within the prohibition of the statute which legislated against gift enterprises.

UPLIFT FOR DRINKING MAN

Chicago Judge Would Reform "Booze Fighters" By Loving Kindness.

CHICAGO, April 13.—Is it right to class a drunken man as a criminal? Municipal Judge McKenzie gives an emphatic "No" to the question and has set on foot a movement for the uplift of the drinking man. Here are some of the recommendations and views he set forth in a letter to Mayor Busse.

That every intoxicated man, who is merely helpless and not noisy or disturbing the peace be accompanied to his residence by an officer instead of being locked up in the police station.
The purpose of the police department should be to do the most good for the greatest number of persons.
"It will promote a spirit of kindness rather than revenge. To arrest a man for drunkenness only savors of revenge."
"For a man to be brought home by an officer will have as great a moral effect as to take him to a police station."

INSULT IS RESENTED.

Representative Wiley of New Jersey Avenges President Taft.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 15.—Resenting the alleged insult offered President Taft when he was harassed at the Woman Suffrage Convention here last night, Representative Wiley of New Jersey today declined the request of the New Jersey Woman Suffrage Convention that he introduce in the House the petition which is being circulated by the suffragists for congressional action for furtherance of their cause.

MT. M'KINLEY TRIP DOUBTED

Fairbanks Men Wager \$100,000 As To Reliability of Latest Expedition.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, April 15.—The committee in charge of the Fairbanks Mt. McKinley expedition desires that the United States government shall detail signal service men from that point nearest Mt. McKinley to make a trip to the vicinity of the mountain and report whether an American flag is flying at the summit. E. W. Griffin and Capt. Barnett of this city have wagered one hundred thousand dollars on the truth of the report of the expedition.

MT. MCKINLEY TRIP.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, April 14.—their trip up Mount McKinley Lloyd's party took photographs of the summit and of all points along the trail. They also established a trail so well that it can be followed by parties next summer. Altiroid measurement taken by the men places the height of the mountain at 20,500 feet.

DOPE SHEETS UPSET AGAIN.

Woman Had Smoked Cigarettes For One-hundred-six Years.

EL PASO, Tex., April 13.—Anti-cigarette agitators were put to rout when it was announced that Juana Corona, who died recently at Patagonia, Ariz., had smoked "paper pipes" for 106 years. The woman was 116 years of age when she died and learned to smoke when she was 10.

Senora Corona was a widow 100 years ago, her first husband dying in 1810. She married three times and her last husband has been dead for thirty-seven years.

She leaves a "baby" 50 years of age, a daughter by her second husband; two grandchildren, seven great-grandchildren and thirteen great - great - grandchildren, all of whom live at Patagonia.

The aged senora was born at Bamora in the state of Sonora, Mexico, Oct. 29, 1794. She was illiterate, but there appears to be no question about the date of her birth.

She was active until a year ago and her mind was clear up to the time of her death.
