EVERYBODY TO BE COUNTED

THE census now being taken will for ten years be the measure of importance and standard of size of every American city.

It is the duty of every resident of Marshfield and every resident of Coos county to be counted. To be certain of this, if you are away from home leave the particulars and names with your neighbor. The Times has already printed the list of questions to be answered. These questions comprise such ordinary matters of fact as the location of one's home, his ownership of it, occupation, education and appearance. There is nothing intrusive or objectionable in any of the questions the census man will ask.

Particular attention is called to the fact that no disclosure about a person or his affairs can or will be made. Every employee of the census is prohibited from disclosing any information. Nor can anybody write to headquarters and find out.

The census, it is always to be remembered, has nothing to do with taxation, service in the army or juries compulsory attendance at school or the enforcement of any law. Its only purpose is to secure information.

It is everybody's duty to answer all questions on the schedules.

It is also everybody's duty to talk about the census and urge friends to do the same.

For years we have been boasting to get people to live on Coos Bay. Now for two weeks we should direct the boosting spirit to counting all who are here.

NOTICE TO VEHICLE OWNERS

Notice is hereby given to owners of vehicles, automobiles and carriages that the new ordinance regulating traffic is now in effect in Marshfield and will be strictly enforced. Drivers and owners of vehicles should acquaint themselves with its provisions at once and avoid trouble. In part said ordinance No. 423 provides as follows:

Sec. 9. No vehicle shall stop with its left side to the curb.

Sec. 10. No vehicle shall stand backed up to the curb, except when actually loading or unloading; and if said vehicle is horse drawn and has four wheels, the horse or horses must stand parallel to the curb and faced in the direction of traffic, but no vehicle shall stand so backed up if it interferes with or interrupts the passage of other vehicles.

Sec. 11. No vehicles shall back to make a turn in any street, if by so doing it interferes with other vehicles but it shall go around the block or to a street sufficiently wide to turn in without backing.
