Asks Pardon—Henry Hoesck, of North Bend is circulating a petition here asking for the pardon of J. Thorburn Ross, the Portland banker under prison sentence for misapplication of funds. Ross' bank failed sometime ago and the case has been hard fought in the courts with the

result that the Oregon supreme court has sustained his sentence. It is understood that many on the Bay are averse to signing the petition for a pardon for the banker before he has done a day's time.

Seats Selling Well—John Herron stated this afternoon that nearly all the reserved seats for the Neill-Day bout Saturday night had been disposed of at noon. This is the biggest sale of tickets that any bout has ever had on the Bay.

He was a guest of District Attorney Brown for some time Monday, the two gentlemen being old time friends.—Roseburg News.

MUST REDUCE PRICE.
 The Roseburg News says: "You can say for me," said Mayor Fred Haynes, "that the 38 blocks of street, recently ordered paved by the voters of this city, will not be treated to bitulthic material unless the companies handling that pavement furnish the same for less than \$2.00 per yard. Last year the city of Roseburg paid the Warren Construction Company \$2.36 per yard—but not so this year, we must get as good a pavement for less money." From Mayor Haynes' statements it appears that he coincides with Mayor Joseph Simon, of Portland, who has succeeded in reducing the price of bitulthic pavement from \$2.25 to \$1.85. Mr. Haynes says that it is the custom of the paving outside of Portland for 10 cents per yard additional to the price charged in the city—therefore Roseburg should get pavement for the sum of \$1.95 per yard.
