C. A. Smith Company Claims Part of Land Grant to Local Railway.

The C. A. Smith company has instituted suit in the federal court at Portland against the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern Railway and Navigaundivided 10-32 interest in the waterfront of what is known as the Rail-6.3 road Reserve extending from the mouth of Mill Slough south beyond 5.9 the railroad docks.
