## WATER FRONT IN LITIGATION

### C. A. Smith Company Claims Part of Land Grant to Local Railway.

The C. A. Smith company has instituted suit in the federal court at Portland against the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern Railway and Navigation Co. to secure possession of an undivided 10-32 interest in the waterfront of what is known as the Railroad Reserve extending from the mouth of Mill Slough south beyond the railroad docks. The property is valued at between \$100,000 and \$150,000.

The suit promises to be one that will be bitterly fought in the courts. The railroad company has been in possession of the tract since the line was built in the early 90s while the C. A. Smith Co. through its subsidiary corporation claims to have a perfect title to the interest in question through its purchase of the E. B. Dean and company holdings. The railroad company's coal bunkers and freight warehouse are located on the strip but they have not occupied it long enough to establish ownership through adverse possession.

According to the claims of the C. A. Smith company, when the E. B. Dean and company granted as part of the bonus for the building of the line certain tracts in South Marshfield, E. B. Dean did not sign the deed granting the water front property in contention. As he held a 10-32 interest in the company, the Smith company which purchased his holdings claim that undivided interest in it. The Farmers Loan and Trust company of New York is made a joint defendant with the railroad company, it having been the deed holders of the local road when it was built and having taken it from R. A. Graham through a foreclosure. While their interest in it was thought to have been wound up by W. S. Chandler as receiver of the line some years ago, the records are not clear and in order to cover any possible defect, the trust company is named as one of the defendants in the petition.

An interesting feature of the shot put was the fine showing made by Will Horton and Lester Isaacson. On the first two throws they used the regular lead shot and put it about ten feet. On their last throw, however, they had a fake shot, which, after having gone through several motions, they put a couple of hundred feet, while the crowd held its breath, later giving way to laughter.

The meet started at about 2:30 with the relay which was close all the way through, the Purple winning by a couple of feet. Torrey, Merchant, S. Clarke and Stutsman ran for the Purple and Welder, Hennessey, Horton and Harrington were on the Gold. The time was 1:48. The other events were:

Pole vault—Won by Welder with Bolt and Clarke tied for second and third place. Height, 8 feet, 10 inches.

220 yard dash—Won by Hennessey, Torrey second, Harrington, third. Time 26 2-5 seconds.

Shot put—Won by Bolt, Clinkenbeard second and Harrington third. Distance 34 feet, 4 inches.

100 yard dash—Won by Jensen, McCullough second. Only two men were entered.

440 yard dash—Only entered by two men. Clarke first, Tribbey second.

Running broad jump—Won by Harrington, Welder second, Stutsman third.

Standing broad jump—Won by Harrington, Stutsman and Tribbey tied for second and third.

100 yard dash—Hennessey first, Torrey second, Harrington third. Time 11 2-5 seconds.

High Jump—Clinkenbeard and S. Clarke tied for first and second, Nichols third.

880 yard run—Won by Harrington Tribbey second, Jensen third.

Hammer throw—Won by Clinkenbeard, Bolt second, Merchant third. Distance 98 feet, 3 inches.

100 yard low hurdle—Won by Torrey, Nichols second, Merchant third. The judges were: Rev. J. A. Moran, I. Elrod, A. Blanchard and N. Johnson. J. Merchant acted as starter and Prof. Hewitt as time-keeper.
