ASSIST THE CENSUS TAKERS.

EVERY citizen of Marshfield owes it to the city, as a matter of civic patriotism, to assist in taking the census. Saturday, May 14 the time granted by the government for the completion of the work will be expired.

The result of that enumeration will determine the city's rank among the cities of the country in hundreds of publications for the next 10 years.

Two estimable ladies have been appointed to do the work for the government in Marshfield and it is no reflection on their ability or accuracy for the citizens to assist in seeing that the city gets a fair and full count. All over the country organizations for the purpose of promoting the growth of their respective cities are taking means to secure a full count of their populations, and the cities of the northwest are probably the most active. In Seattle men are stationed at the docks and railroad stations daily to watch for any residents going to Alaska or other points who will thus be out of the city at the time of the enumeration.

In Portland and Spokane the same aggressive work is being done. In Spokane the officers of the 150,000 club have taken charge of the work and are receiving the loyal cooperation of every citizen. They have arranged a complete checking system with the daily reports of the enumerators, the territory covered by the enumerators one day being re-enumerated the day following by local men. When these cities are making such strenuous efforts it is certainly up to Marshfield to manifest sufficient interest to make a showing.

Mrs. Dungan and Mrs. Hewitt, the Marshfield enumerators, are ladies capably equipped in every way to accomplish their task intelligently and successfully. The action of the Chamber of Commerce is only a prudent business move in line with the other progressive cities of the country to see that no one is overlooked.

Let us by no means, fall into the error of thinking the taking of the census a light matter. It is one of the most serious of our peaceful undertakings, and one of the most costly. An appropriation of \$10,000,000 has already been made to defray the expenses of this enumeration, and another of \$4,000,000 will be necessary. The army employed in taking the census consists of 330 supervisors, 65,000 enumerators and 4000 temporary employees in Washington. In view, then, of the pains taken and the expense incurred in this proceeding, and in view of the great importance that attaches to its accuracy, it behooves every one of the five or six thousand of us, figuratively speaking, to stand up and be counted.

The one essential element of the census, here, as everywhere is to demonstrate the actual growth of the community by securing an exact, and comparative, record of the population. We want neither more nor less people than actually dwell here; but we want them all to the last man, woman and child.

The job is a tedious one, full of detail and data, and its comprehensive and entire fulfillment serves a great end; yields a vast amount of satisfaction to every growing and ambitious community. It is up to the people to be good natured, perfectly tolerant of the numerous questions submitted to them by the enumerators and a faithful accounting by them of all that shall be demanded by the Government.

Marshfield and Coos Bay want to figure as handsomely as may be in the new census and our people must act promptly, in conjunction with those detailed by Uncle Sam to ascertain who belongs here as citizens, intending citizens, voters and residents. The enumerators cannot do the trick by themselves; they must have intelligent and practical assistance from everybody in the game.

Perhaps it was not to be expected of Roosevelt.
