DEFENSE HAS INNING.

Dr. Hyde Gets Favorable Evidence Before Grand Jury. (By Associated Press.)

KANSAS CITY, May 6.—That the signs of cyanide in the stomach of Colonel Swope might have resulted from the mingling of the formaldehyde injected in the embalming fluid and the natural ammonia of the body testified Dr. Walter M. Crass in the Hyde trial today.

BAKERS TO FIGHT CONTROL BY CITIES

Will Contest Ordinances Limiting Price to Be Charged for Loaf of Bread.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 5.—In conformity with a resolution adopted by the executive committee of the organization here, the National Association of Master Bakers will carry to the supreme court of the United States a case to test all city ordinances and statutes limiting the price to be charged for a loaf of bread.
